

MYTHS ABOUT PASTORS: Myth: Pastors are too busy with "more important things" than to be "bothered" by your concerns and problems...

Truth: I was ordained to be available to you, at your service, no matter how "small" your concern! Please let me know if I can help, even if only to be a listening ear!

Myth: Your pastor knows your giving patterns and giving history...

Truth: While I could look up your giving history, I have not, and don't necessarily plan to. Besides, I realize that some parishioners give only cash, and this is not recorded.

Myth: Your pastor notices every time you're not at Mass...

Truth: I do not notice every time a parishioner is absent, but if I do, I give them the benefit of the doubt; maybe they're away visiting family, maybe attending Mass at a local parish, etc.

Myth: Your pastor remembers every sin you confess and looks at you differently after the confession...

Truth: I do not look at people differently after they confess; God gives me the grace to forget what I hear!

Myth: Your pastor doesn't want to get to know you and your family; doesn't want to be invited over...

Truth: I want to get to know as many of my parish families as possible! I really enjoy being invited to dinner and/or a house blessing.

Myth: Your pastor finds writing and preaching homilies to be easy...

Truth: Writing homilies is one of the most challenging and time-consuming tasks of my week. Preaching is never easy for me.

Myth: Your pastor does not want feedback on homilies...

Truth: I do want constructive feedback! How can I improve my homilies without your feedback?

Myth: Your pastor is lonely and should be pitied...

Truth: Your pastor is blessed with 8 siblings and the ability to visit my parents a couple times a month and friends back home and in the area. Whenever I'm feeling lonely in the rectory, I can turn to Jesus and Mary in my heart, or go into the church and sit in front of the tabernacle, where I feel Jesus' Presence and love for me in the Blessed Sacrament

Myth: Your pastor works weekends, but the rest of the week he doesn't do much...

Truth: I work all week long, and obey God's 3rd Commandment by taking Mondays off, when I seek rest, recreation, and renewal.

Is 45:1, 4-6 | 1 Thes 1:1-5B | Mt 22:15-21

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I took up distance running some years ago, thanks largely to a group of friends who encouraged me along the way. We'd share the peaks and valleys of our lives as we tackled rolling hills. Those long runs come to mind when I hear Paul give thanks to the Thessalonians for having "endurance in hope of our Lord Jesus Christ." Paul here speaks of hope in Jesus – a hope that has the risen Christ as its foundation, and is central to the Christian life. When I think of what lies at the end of a long run, such as water and blissful rest, and how grateful I am for these simple pleasures, I cannot help but rejoice in the hope that St. Paul refers to today. Our catechism makes it clear: "We firmly believe, and hence we hope that, just as Christ is truly risen from the dead and lives forever, so after death the righteous will live forever with the risen Christ and he will raise them up on the last day." (989)

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

During a particularly challenging time, I confided in a close friend over the phone. She didn't just offer to pray for me, she actually prayed with me on that phone call. I don't recall her exact words, but she called on Jesus to help me trust that God would see me through. So often, it can be hard to find the words to encourage others in their faith. When that happens, why not bring Jesus into the conversation? It may seem awkward at first, but offering to pray with another person in real time can be a powerful witness and encouragement. As Christians, we don't rely on "hoping" that everything will work out in the end; instead, we know that our hope is in Christ Jesus. As the catechism says: "Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness." (1817) It doesn't get much more direct than that. Reflect on what "hope" looks like for us as Christians. And then tell a friend about it.

DID YOU KNOW? The source of our second reading today, the First Letter from Paul to the Thessalonians, contains the earliest mention within Christian literature of the three theological virtues: "faith, hope and love." Reread today's passage, and then read 1 Thessalonians 5:5-8. In prayer, we can ask God to help us grow in all three virtues and show us ways to share them with others.
