

Christ's Mission Appeal: "God has made every grace abundant for you so you can glorify God through your generosity." (2 Corinthians 9)

This weekend is our kick-off for our annual diocesan appeal, which is no longer called CSA (Catholic Services)! Instead, Bishop Gruss, in order to emphasize the reason for the appeal, has renamed it "Christ's Mission Appeal"! What is the reason for the appeal? To support the mission of our Living Lord Jesus Christ in our diocese. Christ is always on a mission to help form us into saints in love with God, and to send us out on mission!

This appeal supports many different Works of Mercy in our diocese. I'd like to highlight a couple items funded by this appeal: the FAITH Magazine, and Cathedral live-streaming. This helped many during the lockdown, and continues to help those unable to join us on the weekends. Our staff and I have benefitted from diocesan services in many ways. We regularly call diocesan staff for priceless,

vital help with various administrative and financial questions. They even visit our parish occasionally to assist us!

God has been generous to us, and cannot be outdone in generosity. Our parish target this year is \$56,548, less than last year. Last year we fell short of our target, but thanks be to God, we paid it off through savings in operating expenses and funds in our savings account. Thank you for your generosity to the diocesan appeal in the past, AND thank you in advance for your generosity to **Christ's Mission Appeal!** How should you and I discern how much to give? First, we thank God for everything. Gratitude chases away hopelessness and other evil spirits, fills us with hope and joy, and makes us more like Christ. Second, we ask the Lord to show us what He is calling us to give. It may be more or less than last year. Third, we remember that He always calls us to give sacrificially, in imitation of Him who gave Himself sacrificially for our salvation. He continues to do so at every Mass, saying to you and me, "This is my Body... given up for you." When we give sacrificially "from our need", rather than "from our leftovers", we will experience the surprising joy of "[glorifying] God through [our] generosity."

Pope Francis' Opinion on Same-Sex Civil Unions

Pope Francis is reported to have commented in the film Francesco, "Homosexuals have a right to be part of the family. They're children of God and have a right to a family." Points to remember:

- 1. Persons are who attracted to other people of the same sex are God's beloved ones! Jesus died for them and offers membership in His Church.
- 2. Marriage is a permanent union between a man and a woman that is open to the procreation of children. "Same-sex marriage" is an impossibility [just like a "square circle" is an impossibility] so the Catholic Church could never approve of it.
- 3. The Catechism says, "The number of men and women who have deep-seated homosexual tendencies is not negligible. They do not choose their homosexual condition; for most of them it is a trial. They must be accepted with respect, compassion, and sensitivity. Every sign of unjust discrimination in their regard should be avoided." While Pope Francis has suggested that same-sex civil unions could be acceptable [possibly to provide for issues like hospital visitation, pastoral outreach, etc.] he is not condoning homosexual behavior.
- 4. The Pope has NOT changed the teachings of the Church. He has expressed his opinion, and Popes are sometimes wrong in their opinions. He was not speaking "infallibly."

Mother Mary, we pray for the gift of purity for all people, especially those suffering addictions to any form of impure behavior, and for the transformation of our culture, in Jesus' Name, Amen!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In today's Gospel, Jesus has just silenced one group of religious leaders, the Sadducees (which seems to be quite a feat, if we look at their behavior in the Scripture!) and is now speaking to another group of religious leaders, the Pharisees. Jesus says that the greatest commandment in all the law is actually two: love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, and soul; and love your neighbor as yourself. These two groups of religious leaders like to test him a lot, and while I might want to tell people like them to take a hike, Jesus never does. He always speaks the truth to them, in love, even if he is frustrated with their behavior.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Sometimes it's hard to see how three particular readings fit together on a Sunday, but I was struck by how well these do. The first reading, listing ways that we should not behave, can easily be summed up as: love your neighbor as yourself. We all are, or have been, some form of what the Lord mentions: an outsider (alien), vulnerable (widow/orphan), in financial need (loan recipient), or requiring some other assistance (needing a cloak). How do we want others to treat us in those times? Then we should behave the same. It seems like the Thessalonians understood this, for Paul praises them for being a model for other believers. They have a reputation for being truly loving; of turning to God from idols, and serving him. We can be discouraged by our human failings, as all of us living in lockdown/quarantine these recent months know. It may not take much to set us off. But this is where God's grace can help us to speak truth in love, and be a model for those around us.

ACTIONS Reflect on any obstacles to truly loving God with full heart, mind, and soul. Then think creatively about how to love God, and in turn, others.

- How I can love God with my whole heart? After spending time in prayer, write down how you see God in your family and friends. And then go tell them!
- How I can love God with my whole mind? Use "online time" to engage with a faith-related website such as Bishop Barron's wordonfire.org, or follow Pope Francis on Twitter.
- · How I can love God with my soul? Pray the litany of humility.
