Dear Reader, fellow **Saint-in-the-Making**, Happy 33rd Week of Ordinary Time! Happy Opening Day for Regular Firearm Deer Season! If you're a hunter, or know a hunter, make sure to ask St. Hubert (patron of hunters) for a safe and successful hunt!

First, some humor: 1. Dust Off that Ash Wednesday Joke! The pastor commenced praying with the words "Oh Lord, without you we are but dust." As he paused for a dramatic effect, a small child's voice was heard to say, "Mommy, what is butt dust?" 2. After the wedding, the little ringbearer asked his father, "How many brides can the groom marry?" "One," his father said. "Why do you ask?" Because the priest said he could marry sixteen," the boy said, puzzled. "How'd you come up with that?" his father asked. "Easy," the little boy said. "All you have to do is add it up, like the priest said: 4 better, 4 worse, 4 richer, 4 poorer."

Concerns about Safety at Mass: I am grateful to a parishioner who informed me of her concerns. She was concerned about the fact that at Mass, I often have "sniffles." The truth is I have them year round, and it's not allergies; it's unknown why. If I ever have any Covid symptoms, I will get tested. Another concern was that the ciborium (metal contained with the hosts) is not within 6 feet of me on the altar, a valid concern. So, I will cover these hosts at each Mass. A concern was about a musician not wearing a face covering. Organists/cantors/readres need not wear them due to their distance. A concern was about the amount of singing. We are permitted to have singing, but reduced, for example, not all of the verses. I am monitoring what the diocese permits and recommends for our safety. Eventually, Saturday Mass will be live-streamed for those who cannot join us due to risk of infection. (If interested in donating towards a new camera, let me know)

Receiving Holy Communion: please take face covering down BEFORE you approach the priest/ Extraordinary Minister distributing Communion, hold hand FLAT to receive (if not flat, minister is likely to touch your hand), pick up Host and consume immediately, rather than walking away with it and then consuming, to prevent the risk of dropping. Thank you!

Positive Country: I didn't grow up listening to country, but now that I've discovered 103.7, I'm listening to it a lot! One of my favorite songs I've heard recently: All I Ever Needed by Bruce Lee White. I love the fact that so many songs mention putting God first!

My Vocation Story, Short Version: God led me to the priesthood through many "stepping stone encounters" with God. These led me to real, physical encounters with Christ, especially in the Scriptures and in the Eucharist at Mass and Adoration. Some stepping stone encounters I had growing up include encountering Christ in my parents who are both converts to Catholicism. Also, I encountered Christ in the beauty of praise and worship music at prayer meetings where miraculous healings occurred. I encountered Christ objectively in the poor in Juarez, Mexico, who were full of joy at Mass even though they lived in shacks with dirt floors. I encountered Christ at a Steubenville youth conference in 11th grade. I heard him tell me, not with my ears but with my heart, "I'll always be here for you; I'll never leave you!" I was amazed that my Creator, the Savior of the World, Jesus Christ Himself, loves "little ol' me", Nate Harburg, personally, and is always gazing upon me with eyes of love.

I met with a priest who told me to meditate on the story of the calling of Samuel, especially Samuel's prayer, "Speak Lord, for your servant is listening." I made it a priority every single day to encounter Jesus in Mass and Adoration. Because I started going to Adoration, I read more Scripture, and Jesus spoke to me clearly and personally through the Gospels, especially Luke 18. Eventually, I joined the seminary, and was ordained in 2011. I will thank God for all eternity for choosing "little ol' me" to be a priest, even though I'm a weak and selfish sinner. I beg Jesus to help me, and each Good Shepherd Parishioner, to cooperate with Him in His work of saving people from the hell of separation from God, for the heaven of union with God- all people within our parish boundaries, whether Catholic or not. Thank you Jesus for calling us to cooperate with You, as Your Body on earth!



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I'm bemused by the servant in today's Gospel who basically buries the single talent that was entrusted to him. (A talent was an ancient measuring unit of weight for silver and gold.) Meanwhile, the other two wisely invested the talents entrusted to them, and doubled their money. Building on last week's Gospel which showed those who were prepared to meet the bridegroom were invited into the wedding feast, this parable challenges us to realize that the invitation to the feast is the beginning, not the end. We are not to rest comfortably with what we have been given - the gift of faith - but to invest in the Kingdom, and to build on that gift of faith. For example, we may have a palpable experience of God's presence at a retreat or through Eucharistic adoration. However, if that goes no further than being buried as a memory or feel-good experience, we are no better than the wicked, lazy servant. Faith is a gift intended to be put into practice and shared. When we invest in it through the sacraments, serving others, and reading the Scriptures, our faith will continue to grow.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

So, I'm a bit of a hoarder. I cling to mementoes of days past, whether it's my son's first plastic Playskool vacuum (sold at a garage sale by my husband, but that's another story), a book given to me by a friend, or a treasured letter. I admit I relate to the servant who buried his money for fear he'd lose it. Sometimes I think I cling to memories - relationships and experiences that are important to me - and fail to invest in what makes those memories valuable. A similar dynamic can happen with our faith and our friendship with Jesus. We can go through the motions without giving it much thought. Today's Gospel challenges us to seek opportunities to grow in our faith and "make new memories" with Jesus - to invest in building the kingdom of God, whether that's inviting a friend to Mass, returning to the Eucharist ourselves, or spending more time with Scripture. By putting our faith into action in this way, we cannot only grow in our faith, but invite others to come along with us on the journey.

ENCOUNTER Find a Eucharistic adoration chapel near you and spend some time with Christ. Thank Jesus for the blessings in your life. Bring him your needs. Ask Jesus to give you his grace that you might grow in union with him.
