
Giving Tree


Fr. Nate's Update- November 29, 2020

Dear Reader, fellow **Saint-in-the-Making**, Happy First Sunday of Advent!

First, some humor: At the congregation's annual Thanksgiving Dinner they invited the poor of the community for a free meal. Year after year there was never enough turkey legs for everyone who wanted one, so a local turkey farmer attempted to breed a turkey with more than two legs. One year, as the church was preparing the

Thanksgiving Dinner, the farmer told the pastor that he finally succeeded in breeding a bird with six legs. "Wow!" the pastor exclaimed. "Let me see it!" "I have a small problem," the farmer said. "I can't catch the dang thing!"



Have a Blessed Advent! What are some of your family Advent traditions? Our family had a Jesse Tree, and a wreath with candles on the dinner table. Every night before dinner, we'd use the Jesse Tree to learn about Jesus' ancestors, and pray sing a song and light the Advent candles. These two traditions made it exciting for us kids to prepare for Jesus' coming into our hearts at Christmas. Inspired by Denise Kubacki's creative idea last Advent at our St. Joseph church, I will be "lighting" Advent "candles" (bushes with purple/blue Christmas lights) on them each week. The third week, the bush will be rose, to match the candle. Check it out when you drive by the rectory, and say a prayer for your pastor, I humbly beg you.

"Put yourself in their shoes": Many parishioners, friends, and family have underlying medical conditions that increase their risk for, "Severe illness from COVID-19" which "is defined as

hospitalization, admission to the ICU, intubation or mechanical ventilation, or death" (CDC). Do those of us without such underlying conditions put ourselves in the shoes of those who do, in the way we talk about Covid? Do we minimize the risk of severe illness for others? Some people with underlying conditions have heard others talking or posting on social media about Covid in a flippant way that makes them feel like they don't really care about their risk, or feel like their life has no value. Tweets like, 'Stop worrying, we're probably all young and healthy here' are not helpful to those with compromised immune systems, who are wondering: "Will I get it? Is it in my community? If I do, can my body fight it? Should I quit my immunosuppressants? Should I stock my house and stop going into work?" These questions can be agonizing. The anxiety can be intense, even for those with deep faith.

A question I have been wondering about: Is it Christ-like to make light of Covid as if it's no big deal, even if the vast majority of cases do not result in serious illness, even if the number of Covid deaths has been over-reported, even if there is harmful government overreach in response to Covid? Is it Christ-like to make light of the flu? For many people, the flu can cause serious, life-threatening illness. During the 2019-2020 influenza season, CDC estimates that influenza was associated with 38 million illnesses... 405,000 hospitalizations, and 22,000 deaths. That is why a Sister of Mercy who works at the hospital urged me to get the flu shot, to decrease the risk of infecting the elderly and those with underlying conditions. Let's all put ourselves in the shoes of those who have underlying conditions, pray daily for them. Lord Jesus, please protect all people of all ages with certain underlying medical conditions who are at increased risk for severe illness from the virus that causes COVID-19, Amen.

"Thanksgiving after Communion": "Thanksgiving after Communion is a spiritual practice among Christians who believe in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Communion bread, maintaining themselves in prayer for some time to thank God and especially listening in their hearts for guidance from their Divine guest. This practice was and is highly recommended by saints, theologians, and Doctors of the Church." (Wikipedia)

Here is a traditional prayer after Communion, the Anima Christi:

"Soul of Christ, sanctify me - Body of Christ, save me - Blood of Christ, inebriate me - Water from the side of Christ, wash me - Passion of Christ, strengthen me - O good Jesus, hear me - Within Thy wounds hide me - Suffer me not to be separated from Thee - From the malignant enemy defend me - In the hour of my death call me - And bid me come unto Thee - That with Thy Saints I may praise Thee - Forever and ever. Amen"

At least until Christmas, Holy Communion will immediately follow the final blessing, to minimize the risk of infection by: 1. removing the need to return to the pew; 2. reducing the amount of time inside the building. Please exit the church after you receive Communion. While we are a "living tabernacle", for the few minutes Christ's sacramental Presence remains inside of us, please take a few minutes of quiet prayer in your vehicle, to pray your "Thanksgiving after Communion."

Is 63:16B-17, 19B; 64:2-7 | 1 Cor 1:3-9 | Mk 13:33-37

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Sometimes I grow nostalgic for the laid-back Advents of my childhood: making a list for Santa, digging into the perforated cardboard Advent calendar for chocolate for breakfast, and lighting the Advent wreath (fire!) each Sunday. We all know, however, that the season can quickly become usurped by things to do – shopping, family, cleaning, etc. Today's readings remind us that this is not what Advent is about. The tone in our Scriptures which begin the Advent season is not subtle. Isaiah asks God to return, to "rend the heavens and come down" – to save and deliver his people. The psalm is equally adamant: "Lord, make us turn to you." We, as a Church, are waiting for the fullness of the Kingdom on earth, and we must prepare.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I'm a cradle Catholic, but for me, Advent was always about waiting to celebrate the birth of Christ. I love pulling out the Nativity scene and lighting the candles each week leading to the celebration of Christ's birth. Only in recent years have I grown in awareness of the dual meaning of Advent – that we Christians also are waiting for Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. I admit, it's always seemed to me something far into the future and perhaps not applicable to my lifetime here on earth. However, as Jesus reminds us in the Gospel, "You do not know when the Lord of the house is coming." And while this is true, it not something to fear, but something to prepare for and look forward to! We wait in joyful hope, asking for the grace to remain faithful to our baptism and to live in a way that makes Christ's presence known to others.

STUDY Remember the pre-pandemic holidays? Chances are, you've got some extra time on your hands this season. Why not use it to take a deeper dive into Advent this year, by participating in an online Bible study or reading and praying with the Scriptures each day of Advent.
