Dear Reader, fellow **Saint-in-the-Making**, Happy 32nd Week of Ordinary Time!

First, some humor: 1. From a parishioner: "Last Sunday my niece emailed me after the Mass in her local church. The priest there mentioned that once he asked a class room of children if they would like to be a Saint. All raised their hands except one little boy. When asked why he would not like to be a Saint, he simply said,"I would have to be dead!" --- 2. During a Sunday school lesson, a child learned about how God created human beings. The child became especially focused when the teacher explained how Eve was created from Adam's rib. Later, the boy's mother saw him lying down on the floor, so she asked him what was wrong. He replied, "Mom, my side hurts—I think I'm getting a wife!"

Medical Exemption: If you have a medical exemption for face coverings, you need not wear it at Mass. I know of some parishioners who have this exemption. Otherwise, thank you for wearing it.

Election: No matter who wins, JESUS IS ON THE THRONE! No matter who wins, "God works all things to the good for those who love Him" (Romans 8:28). No matter who wins, pray "for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness" (1 Timothy 2:2 NIV). No matter who wins, remember that YOU have been "elected", which means chosen, by God at your baptism, to become a Saint, a "living image" of Christ! To be holy! To be the hands, feet, and voice of Christ to your friends AND enemies! To bring Christ to birth in your own heart, through prayer and sacraments; to bring Christ to birth in the hearts of others, through works of mercy! To blaze the "light of Christ" in the growing darkness! To "Be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Mt 5:48)... perfect in love for God and neighbor! Lord Jesus, make me more and more your "living image"! Fill me with your Holy Spirit, through the powerful intercession of Mary. Amen!

Homily Feedback: After Mass, I welcome your feedback on my homilies: One thing you liked, and One thing you didn't like (either about content or delivery). What can I do differently in my preaching to help you to encounter God?

Reflection on "Offering it up": We all have small sufferings, annoyances, and discomforts in our daily lives, such as wearing masks, being patient with others, being misunderstood, aches and pains, etc. St. Margaret Mary Alacoque says, "And every time that some punishment, affliction or injustice comes your way, say to yourself: 'Accept this as sent to you by the Sacred Heart of Jesus Christ in order to unite yourself to him'" [by "sent" she does not mean that God actively wills any evil to afflict us, but rather permits it for our good]. She also teaches us a way to "offer up" our sufferings, recommending this prayer: "My God, I do this or I endure that in the heart of your Son... I offer it to you in reparation for anything blameworthy or imperfect in my actions." I would shorten this to, "I offer You this suffering in reparation for my sins" or "for my conversion and the conversion of all!"

Google is a mixed blessing for me. One time, it helped me figure out I had a medical emergency and needed to get to the ER pronto! But a glance at my search history reveals that 99 out of 100 times that I'm searching for wisdom of some sort, I'm searching for things like "meatless Monday recipes," "best long-run shoes," or "living room paint colors" (plus 12 variations on each theme). This recognition came to mind when I listened to the words of our first reading. "She [Wisdom] is readily perceived by those who love her, and found by those who seek her." Hearing this reminds me to spend less time Googling and more time searching for what really matters – God's love, goodness, and wisdom. The Gospel story of the virgins keeping vigil for the bridegroom expands on this, for it is the wise who are most prepared to sustain their watch.

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT


Like many people, I have a bookshelf full of self-help books - guides to parenting, figuring out the color of my parachute, various diets, the magic of "tidying up." Today's readings have me wondering whether these well-meaning efforts to become "the best version of myself," or plumb the meaning of life, miss the point. After all, as today's readings remind us, the source of all wisdom is right before us, in the person of Jesus. We don't have to have all the answers, we just need to know where to look, and to have the patience and wherewithal to be prepared to receive it. By studying the Scripture and opening our eyes to the presence of God in others and even in the challenges we face, we can grow closer to Jesus and be ready to meet the bridegroom when he comes.

REFLECT Read and pray today's responsorial psalm. (Ps 63:2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8)

My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

O God, you are my God whom I seek;

for you my flesh pines and my soul thirsts like the earth, parched, lifeless and without water.
