
# Jesus Thirsts for Your Love! Will you quench His thirst?

Fr. Nate's Update

Dear Reader, fellow Saint-in-the-Making, Happy "Sunday of the Word of God"!

First, some humor: When you carry the Bible, the devil gets a headache. When you open it, he faints. When he sees you living it, he flees!

A father was approached by his small son who told him proudly, "I Know what the Bible means!" His father smiled and replied, "What do you mean, you know what the Bible means?" "That's easy, Daddy....", the young boy replied excitedly. "It stands for 'Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth'!" [I chose these because of their theme, given that this weekend we celebrate...]




A selection from Pope Francis' letter describing this new yearly tradition: "2.... I proposed setting aside "a Sunday given over entirely to the word of God, so as to appreciate the inexhaustible riches contained in that constant dialogue between the Lord and his people" (Misericordia et Misera, 7). Devoting a specific Sunday of the liturgical year to the word of God can enable the Church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world. Here, we are reminded of the teaching of Saint Ephrem: "Who is able to understand, Lord, all the richness of even one of your words? There is more that eludes us than what we can understand. We are like the thirsty drinking from a fountain. Your word has as many aspects as the perspectives of those who study it. The Lord has coloured his word with diverse beauties, so that those who study it can contemplate what stirs them. He has hidden in his word all treasures, so that each of us may find a richness in what he or she contemplates" (Commentary on Diatessaron, 1, 18)."

"... May the Sunday of the Word of God help his people to grow in religious and intimate familiarity with the sacred Scriptures. For as the sacred author taught of old: "This word is very near to you: it is in your mouth and in your heart for your observance" (Dt 30:14)."

- I plan to bless our Lectors at all weekend Masses, as we are encouraged to do on this day
- In this weekend's bulletin, I encourage you to use the prayer ceremony called Enthroning the Bible in the Family. It is for all parish families, whether there are children in the home or not, whether you are retired, even if you are living alone! Please enjoy the ceremony, which will enable you "to show that God is at the center of [your] lives" and remind you to read it
- I highly recommend the Bible in a Year Podcast with Fr. Mike Schmitz
- Right now, I'm listening to the Audiobook of Johnny Cash (yep!) reading the New Testament
- This week, think about: how can I incorporate more Scripture into my daily life?

# Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jon 3:1-5, 10 | 1 Cor 7:29-31 | Mk 1:14-20

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


On first hearing, Jonah's warning to the city of Nineveh seems a bit extreme for my modern ears: Get your act together in 40 days or your city will be destroyed! Yet, rather than panic or rail against him, the people believed and turned away from evil. We hear a similar theme in Mark's Gospel: "The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." Listening to the readings today, I hear these words not as a threat but as an invitation to get our lives back on track. We may not don sackcloth like the people of Nineveh, but we may need to fast from the distractions and skewed priorities that prevent us from loving God and one another. With the psalmist, we pray, "Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my savior."

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I never understood why the middle-school track coach had my son, the shortest kid on the team, run hurdles. I'd shut my eyes and cringe a bit when he'd approach each one, occasionally catching his toe but fearlessly pressing forward. Sometimes the Christian life can feel that way - while I've never tried hurdles, I'm known to trip on the slightest crack in a sidewalk. Likewise, I often trip up on the path to becoming a better person - blurting out unkind words, spending more time online shopping than praying ... well, I won't make you cringe by oversharing my "sin list." In today's readings, the Lord invites us to repent - to turn away from bad habits and choices. By turning to the Lord, we can overcome the obstacles that hold us back from living our Gospel values and sharing them with others through the witness of our lives.

**INVITE** Through the sacrament of reconciliation, the Church offers us a standing invitation to experience God's unconditional love and mercy. Whether you go regularly or it's been awhile, consider participating in the sacrament and inviting others to do the same.





# Enthroning the Bible in the Family

To show that God is at the center of their lives, many families enthrone the Bible, the Word of God, in a visible place in their homes. By placing the Sacred Scriptures in a prominent place decorated with flowers and art, and by gathering at this spot for daily prayer, families show that God is present and active through his Word.

Enthroning the Bible in your home is easy. Simply pick a place where the Bible can be honored. The Bible should be placed where it will be seen regularly, but the location should be apart from the noise and confusion of the family entertainment. Place the Bible, opened to a favorite passage or the readings of the day (these can be found at <a href="https://www.usccb.org/nab">www.usccb.org/nab</a>), on a table or shelf. Decorate the area around the Bible with a cloth, flowers, and/or a candle—whatever makes sense to you. Use the following ritual prayer when you gather as a family to enthrone the Bible.

# Things to Prepare

Bible

• A shelf or table where the Bible will be placed (the shelf may be adorned with a cloth and candles)

#### Ritual

When possible, the ritual may start outside the main door to the house or outside the main entrance to the room. One member of the family holds the Bible, raised slightly. The father, mother, or other leader begins the celebration with the opening litany:

Leader:

Our Lord Jesus Christ, you are the Word of the Father.

Response:

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Leader:

You became one with us to tell of the Father's love.

Response:

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Leader:

You are the light that shines in the darkness.

Response:

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Leader:

You save us from fear and break the bonds of sin and death.

Response:

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Leader:

You come to guide our steps and lead us to God.

Response:

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Leader:

You are the Word of eternal life.

Response:

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Leader: You fill us with the Holy Spirit.

Response: Come, Lord Jesus, come.

As everyone enters the house or room, they may sing a suitable song.

Then one of the following Scripture passages is read from the Bible:

Matthew 4:17-23 Jesus calls and heals through the power of his Word.

Mark 4:1-20 The Word is like the seed.

Luke 4:14-21 Jesus proclaims the Word in Nazareth.

John 1:10-14 Jesus is the Word of God and the light of the world.

After the reading, the leader places the Bible in the place prepared for it. All bow deeply before the enthroned Bible.

#### Leader:

We have heard your words, Jesus.

They give us joy and bring light and truth into our lives.

Your presence gives us peace in our troubled and divided world.

Let your Word create in our hearts a deep desire for you.

Be with us in our hearts and homes, in our community and country.

Give us your Holy Spirit to help us to understand your Word.

We enthrone now this Holy Bible in our midst.

Make your Word the center of our lives.

May your Word inspire all that we think and say and do.

May your Word bind us together in unity with each other and with you,

today and forever.

Response: Amen.

All join in saying the Lord's Prayer.

All repeat after the leader:

We promise to respect the Word of God in our midst.

We shall read and reflect on it as a family of God.

May we draw from it inspiration for our decisions,

strength for our work,

and comfort in suffering.

Jesus, help us to be faithful to our promise,

you who live forever and ever.

Amen.

The celebration concludes with a sign of peace.

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
