Dear Reader, fellow **Saint-in-the-Making**, Happy 2nd Sunday of Lent!

First, some humor:

After dinner, he goes into the kitchen to thank the chefs. He is met by two brothers, "Hello, I'm Brother Michael, and this is Brother Francis."



"I'm very pleased to meet you. I just wanted to thank you for a wonderful dinner. The fish and chips were the best I've ever tasted. Out of curiosity, who cooked what?" Thursday Night Prayer and Friday Daytime Prayer: The Rosary is powerful and I ask everyone to pray it daily. However, the Liturgy of the Hours is the most powerful and recommended prayer of the Church, second only to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass! It's not only for priests and nuns; millions of lay people worldwide pray it daily, as the Second Vatican Council asked for.

It includes seven prayer times: Morning, Daytime (3 times), Evening, Night, and the Office of Readings. On Thursdays at 7:30pm at St. Columbkille, after 7pm Mass, join us for Night Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours (about 10 min). On Fridays at 10:45am at St. John, join us for Daytime Prayer (about 10 min). No book required.

Disciple Maker Survey (February 17-March 22): Please take the survey, either paper or online. It will MAKE you a better disciple (student) of Jesus, and help you to go and MAKE disciples!

Youth Group Easter Card Outreach: This Easter we will send Easter Cards to our homebound. Please contact the office to submit a name and address to our list. Also, we will send cards to parishioners at some local nursing care facilities.

Audiobook Outreach: There are many audiobooks and talks on CD available at the office. Do you know a homebound person or someone in a nursing care facility? Consider borrowing an audiobook and bringing it to them, along with a cheap \$15-20 CD player, if they need it. It's both a way to serve Christ in the homebound, and to evangelize them (if the audiobook is about the Faith!)

Praise Reports Requested:

I'd like to share "praise reports" of:

- 1. ANSWERED PRAYERS FOR HEALING: short testimonies of spiritual, physical, emotional, or any kind of healing of anyone you have prayed for, even yourself. It doesn't need to be "miraculous"; it could be a gradual healing or a successful surgery.
- 2. MISC. ANSWERED PRAYERS: any kind of answered prayer (e.g. "Yesterday the Lord took away my anxiety about my upcoming doctor's appointment!")

Why No Gloria and Alleluia During Lent? Article at aleteia.org, by Philip Kosloski: "Even the liturgy "fasts" in preparation for the glorious season of Easter... First of all, the Gloria is a hymn that celebrates the coming of the Lord using words from the angels at Christ's birth. The Church during Lent returns in spirit to a time when the people of God were in exile, waiting for the Messiah to come and save them. It is a similar season of expectation as is Advent, but instead of awaiting Christ's birth from the womb of Mary, the Christian people await Christ's second "birth" from the womb of the sepulcher.

"Secondly, following this same spirit of exile, the Church joins Moses and the Israelites as they wander in the desert for 40 years. It is a time of agony and purification, one where the faithful join together in saying, "How shall we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?" (Psalm 137:4) The word "Alleluia" is rooted in a Hebrew expression that means "praise the Lord" and is thus omitted during Lent.

"As a result, our focus in Lent is not in rejoicing, but in mourning our sins, looking at those things that prevent us from an authentic relationship with God. Once these are removed through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, we are able to rejoice again at Easter, for it is not only Christ's resurrection that we celebrate, but our own rebirth in the spirit..."

Let Us Pray: (Pope's Feb. Intention): Let us pray for women who are victims of violence, that they may be protected by society and have their sufferings considered and heeded by all, Lord hear our prayer!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


Oh, the gloom! The view out my window on a typical Michigan winter day can be described as "grayscale monochrome," a technical term for black-and-white photographs. Fortunately, the sun peeks out on occasion, providing a lovely sunrise or sunset that can lift my mood and remind me that spring will come. If such an ordinary thing can provide hope, imagine what the Transfiguration provided for the disciples who witnessed it? "His clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them." And even though they were so terrified, the voice of God came from a cloud, conveying comfort and truth: "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." The disciples did not know what lay ahead, but this vision of Jesus and the Father's presence in their midst would give them hope and foretell Jesus' glorious resurrection. As we continue on our Lenten journey, we can turn to God, who will one day transfigure us in the same way Christ was, to strengthen us through the gray days ahead. And St. Paul's powerful words that "God is for us" add solace and encouragement.


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As Catholics, we are likely very familiar with the four Gospels, but I have to say I can't get enough of Paul's letters. Like a good coach, Paul encourages us to dig deep and trust God. In today's reading, he reminds the Romans that God loves us so much that he did not spare his own Son. I'm struck by his assurance that Jesus not only died and was raised for us, but "indeed intercedes for us." Lent is an ideal time to turn to Jesus in prayer, asking that he give us the grace to grow in faith and turn away from sin. At the same time, we can offer intercessory prayer for others, just as we do at every Mass. Perhaps as we continue our Lenten journey, we can make an extra effort to pray for the needs of other people: Those we know personally, such as friends and family members; and those whom we do not know, such as government leaders or Christians experiencing persecution in other countries.

PRAY I find that I often make prayer all about me! Yet, as the Church teaches, "in intercession, those who pray look 'not only to their own interests, but also to the interests of others,' even to the point of praying for those who do them harm." (*ccc* 2635) One way to practice intercessory prayer is to make a list and pray for the people and intentions on it once a day. For those of us who regularly pray the rosary, another practice might be to dedicate each decade to an individual in need of prayer.







Butchered Sacrifice being put back together






