Jesus Thirsts For You: Jesus wants us to get to know Him, to believe in Him, and to love Him. He thirsts for our Faith and for our Love. "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." If you knew the gift of God, in other words, the Holy Spirit and all the Gifts of the Spirit. "If you knew... who it is that is saying to you, Give me a drink'"; in other words, if you knew ME! Jesus wants you to get to know Him personally. Why? He thirsts for your faith and for your love.

Liturgy Q & A: Q: A parishioner asked, why is it that at Mass, before the words of consecration, the priest doesn't break the bread while he is saying, "He broke the bread, gave it to his disciples" (Why does he still wait until the Lamb of God to break the bread?)

A: Short Answer: The Mass is not a dramatic replaying of the Last Supper. Breaking the bread during the Eucharistic Prayer is a liturgical abuse that goes against ancient tradition.

Long Answer: [From Fr. Edward McNamara EWTN.com] "The institution narrative describes four actions of Christ: taking the bread, giving thanks and praise, breaking the bread, giving it to the disciples... Indeed, the Latin Church has ritually structured the Liturgy of the Eucharist and of holy

communion around these four moments. Taking the bread is expressed above all by the rite of presentation of the gifts. Giving thanks and praise is the essence of the Eucharistic Prayer. Breaking the bread is carried out in the fraction and giving it to his disciples is done at communion.

"The institution narrative is within the Eucharistic Prayer and thus falls within the context of giving thanks and praise to God the Father. The supreme act of thanks and praise is the paschal mystery of Christ, the Word made Flesh. In the institution narrative the Church relates to the Father the action of his Eternal Son and his command to continue this memorial action. This efficacious memorial is not limited to the transubstantiation of the sacred species but makes present the whole mystery of salvation in recalling Christ's death, resurrection and ascension into heaven. No other act of thanks and praise to the Father can equal what occurs during the Eucharistic liturgy....

"...The Roman rite, in placing the fraction after the Eucharistic Prayer and accompanying it with the chant "Lamb of God," underlines that we share Christ our Redeemer and not just ordinary bread. We participate in a sacrificial banquet. Our request for mercy and peace is strengthened by this faith. Breaking the host before the consecration, and thus before completing the thanks and praise, impinges upon [negatively affects] this meaning."

Parishioner Praise Report: "I am hoping that I can change or touch maybe one person's life! I lost my faith and love for God! I turned to sin and drugs instead. I created a mess of my life! I had an emptiness inside me ever since I started using drugs and alcohol at a young age, but it took me years to learn that God is the answer! I was the lost sheep and he brought me back home! I have done so many horrible things in my life... But God brought me back from the dead! I didn't see it at the time but God was with me through it the whole time! I believe again and have been saved by the grace of God. He forgave all my sins in the sacrament of Confession and gave me a fresh start. Now I am ready to face all my troubles because he has so much love that I am not scared anymore! -a parishioner


We all have mementoes that we treasure – a handmade Mother's Day card, a delicate glass sculpture inherited from a relative, perhaps a fine piece of woodwork or beautifully woven quilt. We treasure them because they remind us of someone we love. Now, think about that we are God's "handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for the good works that God has prepared in advance"! Our God, rich in mercy, rich in love, treasures us so much that he created each of us in his image and gives each of us grace – a pure, free gift. As we look in the mirror, we may be tempted to see only our imperfections. But Paul reminds us that if we look at ourselves the way God does and accept the gift of his love and grace, and cooperate with it working in us, we can live in Christ in the here and now, by extending love and mercy to others, and in eternity, in God's loving embrace.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Reading the news and social media, the phrase in today's Gospel that "people preferred darkness to light" seems as true now as it was in John's time. Sinfulness and evil still cause great harm in our societies. The good news is that it is also as true for us as it was then that God sent his only Son, "not ... to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him." Clearly, the world is a work in progress. We are a work in progress. Yet today's readings remind us that we can choose light over darkness by accepting the gift of faith and grace that our patient and merciful God bestows on us. It doesn't mean that we should turn off the news or hide from the world, but instead do our part to bring light to the situations we encounter. We know the kingdom of God won't be built in a day, or even a millennium, but we take a step toward building the Kingdom when we allow God's light to enter our hearts and then share that light with others through our witness, words, and prayer.







The Catholic Relief Services Collection is an opportunity for you to help improve the lives of some of the most vulnerable people around the world and here in the United States.
