If you are able, I encourage you to attend our services this week, and prepare for them by reading the readings before hand. They can be found at USCCB.org. May our heavenly Father help you to continue your Lenten resolutions and draw you into a deeper and more intimate relationship with Christ. May you and I experience true conversion of heart this Holy Week, and a deeper desire to share our Lord's Cross and to cooperate with Him in His Work of redeeming the world. May the peace of Christ reign in your heart and in your home, no matter what happens in the future.

Potential consequences of not wearing a mask at Mass: Bishop Gruss recently said that the more people go to Mass without wearing masks, the more other people may stop going to Mass because they might be afraid (of getting Covid from those who don't wear masks). In other words, by not wearing a mask, you may unintentionally discourage others from attending Mass! I have had complaints from parishioners about other parishioners not wearing masks. Bishop encouraged us to "Offer it up (the suffering of wearing a mask) for someone, [such as for the] conversion of your sibling" who has stopped practicing their faith, etc. Thank you for continuing to wear a mask out of love for others and for our Lord.

Let Us Pray: (Pope's Mar. Intention): Let us pray that we may experience the sacrament of reconciliation with renewed depth, to taste the infinite mercy of God. Lord hear our prayer!

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Is 50:4-7 | Phil 2:6-11 | Mk 14:1—15:47 or Mk 15:1-39

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

From early childhood, I remember Palm Sunday – there was a kind of excitement about receiving the fresh palms, followed by the somber reading of the Passion. The contrast strikes me: While the palms, in ancient times, symbolized goodness and victory, hope and triumph, the account of Jesus' suffering and death reminds us of the price he paid for our redemption. Jesus knew that we can't have one without the other. It is the paradox of the cross: Jesus gave his life so that we might live. For many, the past year has been like one long Good Friday, filled with discouragement, suffering, and loss. As we reflect on Jesus' passion, the palms we carry home remain a sign of hope; we know now how the story will end. As we place our palms in a special place, let us say a prayer of thanks to Jesus and ask for the grace to renew our faith and trust in God as we enter Holy Week.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

There is a richness in the liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil that is both humbling and uplifting. This time period, known as the Sacred Triduum (Latin for "three days"), is the official end of Lent, and the summit of the liturgical year. As a society, we give far more attention to the buildup and celebration of Christmas - which is not to deny its importance, of course! - and so sometimes the Triduum is not as familiar to people in both its meaning and importance. Yet, it is during these days that we most intentionally remember and celebrate the gift of our redemption; we liturgically embrace the paschal mystery of Christ: dying he destroyed our death, and rising he restored our life. We have faced a difficult year together, and we rely on each other for prayer. As we continue through this Holy Week, perhaps we can accompany each other by attending the services with one another, or at least setting aside complementary prayer time on our own.

PRAY A local Eagle Scout built a beautiful outdoor Stations of the Cross at a college campus near us. Visit your parish or outdoor stations and reflect on each one. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has excellent resources for praying the stations: www.usccb.org.









ALTAR

Adam & Eve - The torah teaches that "God formed Adam out of the dust of the ground" and the sages explain that this dust was taken from the ground upon which the Temple's Altar would eventually stand. (Mt. Moriah)

Cain & Abel - On the first anniversary of the world's creation, Cain and Abel presented offerings to God upon the Altar which Adam had built. (On Mt. Moriah) "Cain brought to the Lord an offering of the fruit of the ground, and Abel brought of the firstlings of his flock and of their fat portions..." (Genesis 4:3-4)

Noah - Jewish tradition informs us that Noah's Altar was built on Mt. Moriah, in the same place that Adam's had previously stood.

"Then Noah built an Altar to the Lord, and choosing from every clean animal and every clean bird, he offered burnt offerings on the Altar." (Genesis 8:20)

"It is they who shall enter My sanctuary, they who shall approach My table to minister to Me..." (*Ezekiel 44:16*)

"Thus also shall you purge the Altar in making atonement for it; you shall anoint it in order to consecrate it. Seven days you shall spend in making atonement for the Altar and in consecrating it. Then the Altar will be most sacred, and whatever touches it will become sacred." (*Exodus 29:36-37*)

"You blind ones, which is greater, the gift, or the Altar that makes the gift sacred?" (Matthew 23:19)

"... You cannot partake of the table of the Lord and of the table of demons." (1 Corinthians 10:21)

"The Altar, around which the Church is gathered in the celebration of the Eucharist, represents the two aspects of the same mystery: the Altar of the sacrifice and the table of the Lord. This is all the more so since the Christian Altar is the symbol of Christ Himself, present in the midst of the assembly of His faithful, both as the victim offered for our reconciliation and as food from heaven who is giving Himself to us." (CCC 1383)

"For what is the Altar of Christ if not the image of the Body of Christ? The Altar represents the body of Christ and the Body of Christ is on the Altar." (CCC 1383 St. Ambrose)

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
