GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In each of our lifetimes, we can look back to a time when we witnessed history. Depending on our generation, it's likely we remember exactly what we were doing the day JFK was assassinated, on 9/11 or, more recently, when our school or workplace shut down because of the coronavirus pandemic. Even these far-reaching events pale in comparison to what the disciples witnessed when the risen Christ appeared to them. Assuring them he was not a ghost, Jesus "opened their minds to understand the Scriptures," and reminded them that they were witnesses to a different kind of history - salvation history: "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name." Let us pray that we, too, may have our minds open to the eyewitness accounts in Scripture and our hearts open to repentance, so that "[our] sins may be wiped away."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I'm struck by the disciples' reaction when they realized Jesus really was in the room. They were "incredulous for joy" and "amazed." After this encounter with Jesus, they could not help but share the Good News. Just as the disciples in the early Church testified to Christ's resurrection, today's readings challenge us to share the Good News in a similar way. For many Catholics, this isn't at the top of our skill-set. However, in a 2019 gathering on the New Evangelization, Pope Francis reminds us not to fret over finding the right words. "The joy of the Gospel comes from the encounter with Jesus," he says. "When we meet the Lord, we are inundated by that love of which he alone is capable." This love transforms our whole life, and "the need to announce it arises spontaneously, it becomes irrepressible." The pope's words challenge us first to deepen our relationship with Jesus, then to allow it to transform us, and finally to share Christ's love through our words and actions.

Dear Reader, fellow **Saint-in-the-Making**, Happy Easter... HE IS RISEN!

First, some humor: During her sermon on Jesus's teaching that we should love our enemies, Pastor Sue asked the congregation to raise their hands if they had enemies. Sacrament of Mercy: We have 50 days to celebrate the fact that Jesus is risen and with each of us. Jesus said to St. Faustina, "I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the Fount of My mercy." If you weren't able to go to Confession during Lent, I would like to invite you, on behalf of Jesus, to celebrate this sacrament of healing and JOY sometime this Easter Season! If the

regular times don't work for you, let me or another priest know for an appointment at your convenience.

Venial sins wound our friendship with God, while mortal sins destroy it and completely separate us from God. For a person to be guilty of a mortal sin, three conditions must be met: First, the deed must be "grave matter", second, the person must have "full knowledge" that it is grave matter, and third, give "full consent" of their will. We are forgiven of venial or minor sins at every Mass. But to be absolved from mortal sins, we are to make use of the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Leaving Christ... for Christ: St. Philip Neri taught when we turn from prayer in order to help others, we are "leaving Christ... for Christ." In other words, when we're interrupted during our prayer time and need to do something else, we are "leaving Christ" (in prayer), to serve Christ (in the person in front of us who needs our attention).

Sometimes God calls us to say no to our own plans, and YES to certain interruptions that He allows!

Regina Coeli (Queen of Heaven) During Eastertide, it is traditional to pray the <u>Regina Coeli</u> instead of the Angelus early morning, noon, and/or after Night Prayer. "A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful, who devoutly recite" it during Eastertide. Here it is:

L/ Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia. R/ The Son whom You were privileged to bear, alleluia.

L/ Has risen as he said, alleluia. R/ Pray for us to God, alleluia.

L/Rejoice and be glad, Virgin Mary, alleluia. R/For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

L/ Let us pray: All/ O God, it was by the Resurrection of Your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, that You brought joy to the world. Grant that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may attain the joy of eternal life. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let Us Pray: (Pope's April Intention): We pray for those who risk their lives while fighting for fundamental rights under dictatorships, authoritarian regimes and even in democracies in crisis. Lord hear our prayer!
