

Will you quench His thirst? --- Fr. Nate's Update



Catholic Church Tour: Crossed Keys: "In Christian art, crossed keys, sometimes known as the Keys of Heaven, are a pair of keys that overlap and interlock, creating an "X." The keys are used as ecclesiastical heraldry, papal coats of arms, and symbolic images in holy places... The crossed keys represent the metaphorical keys that Jesus promised to St. Peter, empowering him to take binding actions in leading the institution of the Catholic Church. In short, they are a symbol of the Pope's authority. In the gospel of Matthew, Jesus says to Peter: 'I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on Earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on Earth shall be loosed in heaven.' St. Peter was the first pope, and those who succeed him share in the power Jesus gave him" -https://owlcation.com/humanities/catholic-symbols

By God's grace, this will eventually result in lives spared from abortion!

The Holy Spirit Gives Us Peace: One of the best books I have read about how to seek God's peace is called Interior Freedom by Fr. Jacque Philippe. Fr. Philippe says, true peace and freedom "resides in the possibility of believing, hoping, and loving in all circumstances, thanks to the assistance of the Holy Spirit who "helps us in our weakness." "No circumstance in the world can ever prevent us from believing in God, from placing all our trust in him, from loving him with our whole heart, or from loving our neighbor... If someone sought to prevent us from believing by persecuting us, we always would retain the option of forgiving our enemies and transforming the situation of oppression into one of greater love. If someone tried to silence our faith by killing us, our deaths would be the best possible proclamation of our faith! Love, and only love, can overcome evil by good and draw good out of evil."

So how do we seek God's peace? Holy Communion, Confession, Prayer, meditating on Scripture, reading spiritual books, and spiritual conversation are all non-negotiables. But they are not necessarily enough, unless they actually train us to accept things that threaten to steal our peace, things that seem to limit our freedom, such as our personal weaknesses, our powerlessness, and circumstances that are out of our control, such as the words and actions of others.

Quote to Ponder: "Let those who go bustling about, who think they can transform the world with their exterior works and preaching take note, that they would profit the Church more, and be more pleasing to God, if they spent half as much time abiding with God in prayer... Certainly, they would accomplish more, and with less toil, with one work than they would now with a thousand works, thanks to their prayers and the increased spiritual strength from which they will benefit. Otherwise, their lives would be reduced to making a lot of noise and accomplishing little more than nothing, if nothing at all, or indeed at times even doing harm." ~ St. John of the Cross

Pentecost Sunday

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Come, Holy Spirit!" On Pentecost Sunday, which we celebrate 50 days after Easter, Jesus sends the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. The readings use the language of the senses to describe the powerful presence of the Spirit: A breath, a mighty wind, tongues of fire, a cacophony of languages somehow understood by all. Jesus sends the Spirit upon each of us as well. And while we may not experience the Holy Spirit with our physical senses, I bet each one of us has sensed the Spirit's presence at different times in life: a homily that deeply resonated, a sense of awe at God's creation, a "moral compass" that guided us toward what is right, or when we found the words to console a friend in crisis or vice versa. Just as the Spirit transformed the disciples and emboldened them to build up the Church by carrying on Jesus' mission, we, too, can ask the Holy Spirit to guide us and strengthen us to be a force for love and unity in our families, parishes, and communities.


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's Gospel, Jesus sends his disciples out to continue his ministry, assuring them of the presence of the Holy Spirit to guide them. We, too, have been given the gifts of the Holy Spirit and commissioned to use them to build up the Church. Well before we learned about concepts such as "emotional intelligence" or skills tests, Saint Paul assured the Corinthians that there are many different gifts and ministries, but the same Spirit. Our gifts may even change as we move from one chapter of life to another. For example, high school and college students may help lead retreats or participate in service projects, young adults may build a parish website or lead a Bible study, those who are homebound may offer to pray for others in their parish. For followers of Christ, the only option not on the table is becoming complacent. As we move from the Easter season to "Ordinary Time," let's invite the Holy Spirit to show us how to be "extra-ordinary" in our discipleship in the coming days and weeks. Then follow through.

PRAY Do you sometimes get the Monday blahs? Try starting the day with the Prayer to the Holy Spirit, asking for guidance (and some pep in our step!) as we begin the week:

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.
