Ez 17:22-24 | 2 Cor 5:6-10 | Mk 4:26-34




Many years ago, I met someone whose attentive hospitality cast a seed in me that took root and enabled me to grow as a disciple of Jesus. At the meetings I attended with her, Sister Bridget would immediately greet everyone with a smile, outstretched hand, and, "Hello, I'm Sister Bridget; what's your name?" You couldn't help but feel at ease with her warm greeting, but it didn't end there. Throughout the encounter, she remained just as positive and as completely present as she had in the beginning. Just like the parable of the man scattering seed in today's Gospel, Sister Bridget didn't know how the seed of God's word would grow as she sowed it in her unique, joyful way. To her, maybe her graciousness was the smallest gesture. But the Lord allowed it to sprout and grow, yielding fruit and a bountiful harvest.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's Gospel verse within the Alleluia proclaims, "The seed is the word of God, Christ is the sower. All who come to him will live forever." By our baptism, we are called to continue the work of Christ, sowing the word of God in our world. This may seem an intimidating expectation for all of us who doubt that we have the expertise to "sow" God's word. But in today's Gospel, Jesus tells the crowds that the kingdom of God is like the smallest of seeds, that once sown, becomes the largest of plants. If we believe in Christ and "aspire to please him," God can use our smallest gestures to sow his word in the world. We may not see how our small acts of kindness accomplish this. But if we scatter these "seeds" out of love for God, we can trust they will take root, grow abundantly, and call others to "come to him [and] live forever."

INVITE What "seeds" of welcome can you scatter among those you encounter? Make your "random acts of kindness" regular, intentional acts that express God's love. As St. Thérèse of Lisieux said: "Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing the smallest right and doing it all for love."





FOSTER A CHILD



The Department of Health and Human Services is in need of caring individuals who can provide a safe and nurturing home environment for children who have been placed out of their home due to abuse or neglect.

Children may need foster care for a temporary or extended period of time. The primary goal during foster care is to reunite the child with his or her parents. The foster family plays an important role in the treatment plan for the child and family.

The Department needs committed individuals who are:

- willing to work with the child's birth parents
- supportive of efforts to return the child home
- able to work with children who have significant emotional and behavioral needs
- able to encourage teens toward independent living



You are not required to own your own home, be married or give up your job and stay home full time in order to foster children. You may be renting an apartment or be single. You may apply for day care payments for the time that you are working or continuing your education.


To become a Foster Care Parent-applicants must:

- complete a licensing application
- successfully complete background clearances for all adult household members
- provide medical statements for all household members
- have an environmental inspection (when applicable)
- provide three acceptable references
- pass on-site visits to the home by the licensing worker
- attend training pertinent to foster care issues

The Real Presence

Recently we celebrated the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Did you know that the Eucharist is not only supernatural food? It's also Jesus' continual, substantial,


supernatural food? It's also Jesus' continual, substantial, personal Presence for us outside of the Mass, under the appearances of bread. The Real Presence of Jesus doesn't disappear after the consecrated Hosts are placed in the tabernacle. The tabernacle



serves as the place of reservation for the Eucharist so that Christ in Holy Communion can be brought to the sick.

The saints often spent much time praying before the tabernacle, visiting Him there, and experiencing His love and Real Presence, and being filled with the strength to bring Christ to others through Works of Mercy. Have you ever been to Eucharistic Adoration? We offer it every Friday after 9am Mass at St. John, until 11am (except first Fridays it continues until 4pm).

Did you know that the bible talks about "The Bread of the Presence" in the Jewish Tabernacle (Leviticus 24:1-9)? There were 12 loaves of Bread set out each Sabbath by the Jewish Priests on behalf of Israel. This bread is described as "A Perpetual Due" to be kept "continually" "before the LORD" "as a



covenant forever". A perpetual candle was kept burning continually in a lampstand near this Bread of the Presence. Does this remind you of a perpetual candle in Catholic Churches?

According to the Rabbis, the Bread of the Presence would sometimes be placed on a golden table and lifted up for visitors to see. The priests would say to them, "Behold, God's love for you!" (Babylonian Talmud, Menahoth 29a). Remind you of anything? At every Mass, the priest holds up the Sacred Host for all to see, and says,

"Behold, the Lamb of God!" Also, at the end of Eucharistic Adoration (every Friday morning at St. John Church after 9am Mass), at the benediction, the priest kneels before the Sacred Host in a golden display called the monstrance, and prays, "You have given them Bread from Heaven", and then lift up the TRUE Bread of the Presence, the Eucharist, to bless the people. He uses a veil to hold the monstrance to show that the blessing comes from Christ, not him. Something to ponder from St. Mother Teresa: "When you look at the Sacred Host, you understand how much Jesus loves you now."
