
CONVENTION

Second Sunday of Lent

Gn 15:5-12, 17-18 | Phil 3:17—4:1 or Phil 3:20—4:1 | Lk 9:28b-36

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In today's Gospel from Luke, Jesus is transfigured before the disciples: They see a glorious vision of him wearing dazzling white, with a "face changed in appearance," and conversing with Moses and Elijah about the "exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem." This is in marked contrast to what Luke had recounted just prior to these verses: Jesus' prediction of his suffering and death, and the assertion that his disciples must take up their crosses daily in order to follow him. So it is no surprise that Peter, likely somewhat stunned after being a part of both moments, "did not know what he was saying." Then a cloud passes over and, while they are frightened, they hear God's voice affirm what they have just seen: "This my chosen Son; listen to him." We all experience these extremes - days where all seems lost; others where we feel as though we've had glimpses of heaven. Today's Gospel encourages us to look to Jesus, who has experienced the frailty of humanity and the glory of divinity. Through his suffering, death, and resurrection, we are redeemed, and ultimately as the disciples glimpsed today - "he will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Life can bring unexpected joys and disappointments. One day we celebrate a birth; another we grieve the loss of a loved one. We fall in love; we experience broken relationships. Many of us may find ourselves in flux much of the time: Will this pandemic ever end? Will the cancer recur? What's next now that the kids are grown? Today's readings give me great hope in the knowledge that God is with us through all the twists and turns and ups and downs of our lives. Just as God fulfilled his promises to Abraham, God has given us a Savior in Jesus Christ and promises that we will someday share in his glory. To that end, we can strive to ensure that no darkness in our world prevents us from becoming a source of light to others. Jesus and the saints walk before us. We pray, then, for the grace to listen to God's chosen Son, and to "stand firm in the Lord."

PRAY Lent is a good time to try a new form of prayer. Do you often pray silently? Try the rosary or spoken prayer. Do you normally pray out loud.? Try centering prayer or another form of quiet or silent prayer, such as *Lectio Divina*.

Meeting Wolves and Bears: The Value of a Single Daily Mass: From the "Sketch of the History of the Mission is Ruth (Michigan)" by Fr. F. George Laugel, who served St. Peter and Paul Catholic Church 1890-1910, possibly written as late as 1924:

"In the meantime, the Resurrectionists Fathers of Berlin (Ontario) had taken charge of Parisville and they attended Ruth until 1870, when Father C. Roche was appointed to Port Austin and he attended Ruth, coming once a month until 1873. Father Roche was a Hollander and a real apostle, not second to the great [de Smedt?] and to the many Belgian priests who left their brilliant happy homes and prospects and Catholic manners and habits to Evangelize this country "Date lilia minibus plenis" [Note from Fr. Nate: this is Latin for, "Give me lilies in armfuls", a phrase from Virgil's Aeneid, VI.883] Father Roche was one evening on the Cass road, 50 miles from Port Austin. It was snowing already, and darkness came on him. The people, Mr. Shumacher, begged him to stay overnight, but he would not stay; he would not miss the holy Mass the next day, and so he rode the whole night, meeting wolves and bears, in order not to miss the holy mass the next day, although a weekday." *Please join us for a daily Mass this Lent! It's a great Lenten practice...*

"I know there are people out there—lots of them—who show up Sunday morning and call it good for the week. I know there are people who check Catholic on forms but don't have any kind of a relationship with Christ. I guess I just figured there was a solid core of believers who were in love with Christ—or at least trying to be.

"But I'm reading Sherry Weddell's Forming Intentional Disciples and it's breaking my heart. Almost half of Catholics, she says, don't believe God is a personal God. They don't even believe it's possible to have a relationship with him. Most of us don't pray beyond what's required and when we do it's not about love so much as a sense of duty. We might be committed to the Church, but we're not really committed to Christ.

"I hope this shocks you as much as it shocked me. I hope you're living for Christ and seeking him every day in prayer. But if you're one of those people checking off the boxes, one of those people doing the bare minimum and longing for more, I'm calling you out. Please go deeper. Christ is so much more than you think he is and you can be so much more, too. It's great that you're going to Mass, but I know he wants more from you. He wants more for you. He wants you to know him, to love him, to follow him and be fulfilled by him. He wants your prayer to be more than just lip service. He wants you to want him.

"Maybe that's too abstract, so I'm not staying up in my ivory tower on this one. I'm getting practical. You want to know where to start? Here are 50 ways to approach prayer like it's more than just something to get through so you can get on with your week. Try one, try them all, but try something. You have nothing to lose. You have everything to gain.... [continued next time]
