In This Sunday's Readings:

...He said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none.'" -- Luke 13:7

In this parable, the gardener asks that he be allowed to cultivate and fertilize the soil around the fig tree for just a bit longer to see if the tree will bear fruit. Sometimes we might be like the fig tree. We might need a bit of "cultivation" to recognize our gifts, and how we can share them with others. We can pray to recognize our gifts and be open to those who can help us "grow" those gifts and, in turn, share our "fruit" with others.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


Several years ago, my family gave me a blueberry bush for Mother's Day. It has yet to produce a single berry. However, I can't bring myself to remove it, and today's Gospel encourages me to be patient (a Google search reveals that it can take several years for a blueberry bush to produce a harvest!). The parable of the fig tree shows us how patient God is with us. Like the fig tree, we may not bear fruit or feel as if we're growing spiritually, even as we enter the second half of Lent. Yet Jesus teaches us that if we nurture our faith through prayer and repentance of our sins, we can always grow and blossom. Like the gardener, we need to be patient with ourselves as God is patient with us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It strikes me that in the parable of the fig tree, the gardener offered to cultivate the ground around it. Just as a tree needs light and water and a little individual TLC, it needs good soil. I think for us Catholics, that can be where our parish community and the broader Church come in. Through small actions such as greeting newcomers at Sunday Mass or volunteering in a parish ministry, we can become the fertile soil that nourishes not only our own faith, but that of the entire community. The 2021-23 Synod on Synodality invites us to share our faith and also to listen without judgment to the experiences of others. In doing so, we as a Church can grow stronger. As Pope Francis said in his opening prayer, "May this Synod be a true season of the Spirit! For we need the Spirit, the ever new breath of God, who sets us free from every form of self-absorption, revives what is moribund, loosens shackles and spreads joy."

50 Ways to Talk to God Blog post by Meg Hunter-Kilmer: piercedhands.com/50-ways-talk-god [continued from last week] "...Try one, try them all, but try something. You have nothing to lose. You have everything to gain....

- 1. "Close your eyes and just repeat the name of Jesus.
- 2. Write a letter to God every night for a month. Promise yourself you won't let anyone read them so you can forget the fancy language and get real.
- 3. Read the Song of Songs like Christ is the bridegroom and you're the bride. Because you are.
- 4. When things get crazy, go to adoration at night. Don't try to stay on topic—just talk through all the mess in your life. Talk in circles and get frustrated and pull out your shopping list and process until your mind finally slows down. Work through it all and then just let yourself be. It's a very loud silence, that.
- 5. Pray the news. Beg mercy for sinners, healing for the infirm, justice and peace and God's will in all things.
- 6. Go somewhere beautiful (I recommend Montana) and revel in the majesty of God.
- 7. Hold a crucifix while you pray.
- 8. Pick a small but regular sacrifice (no sugar in your coffee, no condiments, no added salt). Thank Jesus for his sacrifice every time you make yours.
- 9. Pray the Our Father slowly. Take ten minutes to pray it once.
- 10. Ask the Blessed Mother to hold your hand and walk you to Jesus." [#11-20 next time]
