Let MI Kids Learn Petition Drive

The Let MI Kids Learn petition drive is underway to promote educational justice legislation. Michigan children from low-income families would qualify for "Student Opportunity Scholarships" toward their out-of-pocket educational costs at public or nonpublic schools for tutoring, school supplies, computers, and tuition among other expenses. Donors to scholarship organizations would receive a state tax credit. Low-income parishioners and members of our community would benefit from this initiated legislation, regardless of where they send their children to school. The petitions would place this proposal before the legislature, and, if approved, would not require the governor's signature to become law. As this is a nonpartisan effort, Catholic parishes and schools are allowed to circulate petitions. The Catholic Bishops of Michigan support this effort. Please prayerfully consider signing the two required petitions to create the scholarship program and tax credits to improve the education of Michigan's school children.




Good Shepherd Christian Mothers' News!!!








50 Ways to Talk to God by Meg Hunter-Kilmer: piercedhands.com/50-ways-talk-god [#21-30] "...Try one... You have nothing to lose. You have everything to gain....

- ---Memorize a Bible verse first thing in the morning. Make it your theme for the day.
- ---Every night, write down every sin you committed that day. Do it until you just can't take the weight of all those sins, then go experience the sweet release of absolution. After your confession, burn the list.
- --- Pray the Litany of Humility until you mean it. Ouch.
- ---Read Psalm 136, which describes everything God has ever done as being done because of his love. Go through your life from the very beginning and list everything that's happened to you. Follow each event—good or bad— with "for his love endures forever." Let him show you how he used every single thing for your good.
- ---Meditate on sacred art. [website has Jules Bastien-Lepage's Joan of Arc]
- --- Talk to a friend about your relationship with Jesus. Sometimes talking about God becomes talking to God.
- ---Remember: "[God] will give us feelings of love [toward Him] if He pleases. We cannot create them for ourselves, and we must not demand them as a right. But the great thing to remember is that, though our feelings come and go, His love for us does not. It is not wearied by our sins, or our indifference; and, therefore, it is quite relentless in its determination that we shall be cured of those sins, at whatever cost to us, at whatever cost to Him." -C.S. Lewis
- ---Read the day's readings each day. Write down five things you learn.
- ---Some time when you're not tired, lie down in the sun and try to be still with the Lord. You may drift in and out of sleep but you may also surrender your mind and actually manage silence.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

During Lent, we hear familiar stories: the event of Jesus' transfiguration, the prodigal son, and today the woman caught in adultery. Each reveals an aspect of God's perfect love for us and a glimpse of how we can reflect that love toward others. In today's Gospel, the Pharisees once again are testing Jesus, saying the law demands that the woman caught in adultery be stoned. Jesus responds, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." What a perfect response to the Pharisees, and to each one of us when we focus on the faults of another. Jesus' words teach and challenge us to look more closely at the ways we judge others - by appearance, a social media post, political party, for example - and ask ourselves whether we are truly doing so out of love. Closer to home, we may be quick to point out our spouse or children's perceived faults, without acknowledging our own. Jesus invites us to look at others - and ourselves - with the eyes of mercy.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Every time we go out to dinner, my son makes fun of me for agonizing over the menu: "You always regret what you pick!" Indeed, regret can be a powerful emotion. Fortunately, the dinner dilemma requires only that I mooch off of my son's entrée. However, deeper regrets can bog us down and prevent us from moving forward in faith. Today's readings challenge us not to wallow in past mistakes, preconceptions, or bad habits. As we hear in Isaiah, "The things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!" We hear this idea again from St. Paul, who writes of "forgetting what lies behind" and straining forward toward "the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus." In the Gospel, Jesus doesn't dwell on the past sins of the adulterous woman other than to say, "Go, and from now on do not sin any more." Fortunately, our Church offers an antidote to regret and sin in the sacrament of reconciliation. Whether it's been a month or a decade, what better time than Lent to return to this sacrament and experience God's mercy and forgiveness?






The Sacrament of Joy

Scripture tells us, "humble yourself in the sight of the Lord" and "confess your sins to one another" (James 5:16). Jesus commissions his first priests, "If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld." (John 20:23) Jesus had me and you in mind when he instituted the sacrament of Penance, a.k.a. Reconciliation or Confession. He not only forgives us, but also heals and strengthens us, through this powerful sacrament.

This sacrament is a sacrament of JOY, both for us, and for Jesus. Jesus gives us JOY and peace when we meet Him in Confession. We give Jesus the JOY of being our Savior each time we meet Him in Reconciliation! We quench His thirst for love, and His thirst to love us.



Jesus says to you and me, "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. These things I have spoken to you, that my JOY may be in you, and that your JOY may be full." (Jn. 15:10-11). The following truths can prepare us to receive His gift of joy in the sacrament of Reconciliation:

- God thirsts for our love, and thirsts to pour his mercy into our hearts (see St. Faustina's diary);
- Sin destroys joy; "Sin is an utterance, a deed, or a desire contrary to the eternal law. It is an
 offense against God. It rises up against God in a disobedience contrary to the obedience of
 Christ" (CCC¹ #1871);
- Only God can restore our joy through His mercy and forgiveness.

The Catechism puts it beautifully: "Individual, integral confession and absolution remain the only ordinary way for the faithful to reconcile themselves with God and the Church, unless physical or moral impossibility excuses from this kind of confession." There are profound reasons for this. Christ is at work in each of the sacraments. He personally addresses every sinner: "My son, your sins are forgiven." He is the physician tending each one of the sick who need him to cure them. He raises them up and reintegrates them into fraternal communion. Personal confession is thus the form most expressive of reconciliation with God and with the Church. (#1484)

Objections to Reconciliation

"I haven't gone for 40, 50, 60+ years, and I'm embarrassed!" Jesus says, "Do not be afraid..."

"Confession isn't for me: "Christ instituted the sacrament of Penance for all sinful members of his Church: above all for those who, since Baptism, have fallen into grave sin..." (#1446).

"Why confess to a priest? Doesn't God forgive me when I confess in my heart?"

Confession in our hearts is the first step. However, throughout salvation history, God has chosen to use human beings as mediators of mercy, such as Moses, the Jewish priests, etc. Jesus established this sacrament because He wants to use priests as His mediators of mercy. Simply confessing in our hearts does not allow us to meet Jesus in a personal way; it doesn't allow Jesus to forgive us through the priest's prayer of absolution (which removes the guilt and penalty due to sin); it doesn't reconcile us with the Church; it doesn't allow us to receive a medicinal penance or advice from a priest; it

doesn't allow us to experience the spiritual healing of confessing out loud to another person. Last but not least, confessing only in our hearts doesn't allow Jesus to personally address us, through the voice of His mediator, "your sins are forgiven."

"I'm worried the priest will look at me differently": Priests have "heard it all" in the confessional, and are given the grace to forget what people confess and not look at people differently afterwards. The "seal" is absolute; the priest cannot even mention your confession to anyone (including you) without your permission, not even under pain of imprisonment or execution.

"A priest was harsh with me one time": Priests are called to reflect God's love and mercy in the confessional. Psalm 103:13 says, "As a father has compassion on his children, so the LORD has compassion on the faithful" and priests are supposed to reveal the Father's compassion to us.

"I already went this year, isn't that enough?" Monthly or every other month confession brings many benefits and helps us to quickly become like Jesus and fight the battle. Here are some of the benefits: "remission of the eternal punishment incurred by mortal sins; remission, at least in part, of temporal punishments resulting from sin; peace and serenity of conscience, and spiritual consolation; an increase of spiritual strength for the Christian battle" (from Catechism #1496) etc.

How to Prepare

First, beg the Holy Spirit for the gift of true sorrow; next, examine your conscience. Fr. Saunders says, "The examination of our conscience is like stepping back and looking at the picture of our life in comparison to the masterpiece of life revealed by God.... [We] reflect on the progress we have made since our last confession in dealing with weaknesses, faults, temptations, and past sins.... However, when we have gone out of kilter or gone out of bounds with God's masterpiece, we have sinned."

Mortal vs. Venial Sin

Mortal sin destroys our friendship with God; venial sin damages it. Picture a jar filled to the brim with water. Imagine dropping a rock into it. What happens to the water? If we drop in a rock (a venial sin), we lose a bit of water (sanctifying grace). If we dump out the jar (commit a mortal sin), we need to get it refilled as soon as possible, including before we approach Holy Communion! In Reconciliation, Jesus refills our jar with fresh water. "All who are thirsty, let him come to me and drink" (Jn 7:37)

Check out this teaching from the Catechism: "To choose deliberately - that is, both knowing it and willing it - something gravely contrary to the divine law and to the ultimate end of man is to commit a mortal sin. This destroys in us the charity without which eternal beatitude is impossible. Unrepented, it brings eternal death" (#1874). "Venial sin weakens charity; it manifests a disordered affection for created goods; it impedes the soul's progress in the exercise of the virtues and the practice of the moral good; it merits temporal punishment. Deliberate and unrepented venial sin disposes us little by little to commit mortal sin..."

St. Augustine says, "While he is in the flesh, man cannot help but have at least some light sins. But do not despise these sins which we call "light": if you take them for light when you weigh them, tremble when you count them. A number of light objects makes a great mass; a number of drops fills a river; a number of grains makes a heap. What then is our hope? Above all, confession." (1863)
