Rachel's Vineyard Retreat





GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

When will wisdom kick in? Even so many years later, I still struggle with some of the same questions that kept me up at night when I was 21. Fortunately, God is patient with late bloomers. The Book of Wisdom reassures us that, first, God loves us, no matter where we are on the continuum of "having it all together." Second, the Lord won't judge us on our worst days, but wants us to grow in wisdom and holiness. The Wisdom writer knows it's not an overnight process; it is often marked by one step forward, two steps back: "You rebuke offenders little by little, warn them and remind them of the sins they are committing, that they may abandon their wickedness and believe in you, O Lord!" Like Zacchaeus in today's Gospel, if we seek out Jesus and ask for his help, he will show us the way. Thanks be to a God who comes "to seek and to save what was lost."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

At Mass recently, the priest encouraged parishioners to turn to the person next to them and ask them for whom they would like us to pray. I've been at Masses where we introduce ourselves, but this "Hi, how are you, please pray for X" was new to me. As Mass continued, I prayed for Matt, the son of the woman in front of me. She prayed for my friend Jim, whose sore knee had sidelined him during his walk along the Camino de Santiago. How encouraging it must have been for the early Christians to know that St. Paul held them in prayer, "that our God may make you worthy of his calling and powerfully bring to fulfillment every good purpose and every effort of faith." Just as Jesus seeks us out, we, in turn, can accompany others who may be lost or hurting or who just happen to be in the next pew. Through our prayers, we can build up one another, our parish, and the wider Church.

PRAY When a friend shares a struggle or challenge, don't be shy about offering your prayers. Make a list of people to pray for and set it by your bedside so you don't forget.



Brief Teachings on the Mass: October

Mass: Elevator and Time Machine

- Mass: like an "elevator" (brings us up to the Wedding Feast of the Lamb in heaven)
- Mass: like a "time machine" (brings us to the Upper Room and to Mt. Calvary; to the table of the Last Supper and to the Altar of the Cross)
- At every Mass we are mysteriously present at both the Last Supper and at the Cross, we become present to both of these events. We participate in the ORIGINAL events!
- At the Last Supper, Christ offers his Body and Blood to us. On the Cross, Christ offers His Body and Blood to His Father, for our salvation. At Mass, we offer our lives to God with Christ.
- That's why the Mass is often called, "The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass."
- To "understand" the Mass, remember that at every Mass, we "stand under" the Cross! We are with Mary and St. John at the cross, offering our lives in sacrifice to the Father with Jesus

Mass: Personal Encounter with Christ in Four Ways

- Christ invites us to encounter Him personally in four unique ways at every Mass.
- Ever heard the poem, "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways." Christ comes to us in many ways because He loves us, and wants us to love Him more and more.
- To learn these ways, think of four wooden furnishings in every church: the pew, the ambo, the presider's chair, and the altar.
 - o The PEW represents the Community of the baptized: Christ lives in each of the baptized
 - The AMBO represents The Word: The General Instruction says, "Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel" (GIRM, 29).
 - The PRESIDER'S CHAIR represents The Priest: The Catechism says, "It is Christ himself...
 who, acting through the ministry of the priests, offers the Eucharistic sacrifice" (CCC, 1410)
 - The ALTAR represents The Eucharist: The General Instruction states, "Christ is really present... substantially and uninterruptedly under the Eucharistic species." (GIRM, 27)
- Christ invites us to encounter Him personally in each of these four ways.

Introductory Rites: "GATHERING": Part 1

- Entrance Procession and Entrance Chant (song): The Entrance Procession causes to happen what it signifies, i.e. Christ processing into the church, into our community. We rise to our feet and sing a song of praise (Fr. Jeremy Driscoll)
- Sign of the Cross: "From a biblical perspective, every time we trace the sign of the cross over our bodies, we are doing two things. First, we are expressing our desire to be set apart from the corrupt ways of the world in our own day. Second, we are invoking God's protection for our lives." (Edward Sri)
 - Invitation: Make the sign of the cross slowly and with great love
- **Greeting:** "The Lord be With You": from St. Paul's writings.
- **Response:** "And with your spirit": Doesn't mean "and also with you" which is what we used to say. It means we recognize that within the priest's spirit is the mark of ordination which enables him to be our representative of Christ. (Fr. Jeremy Driscoll) It is a prayer for the priest that God will help him to be this representative of Christ.

Vote NO on Proposal 3

DEFEAT THE ANYTHING GOES ABORTION AMENDMENT

This November election, the Catholic bishops in Michigan are urging all Michiganders to vote **NO** on Proposal 3. The measure would add an amendment to the state constitution to:

- Legalize abortion at any time in pregnancy for any reason.
- Allow abortions to be performed by anyone, even those without a medical license.
- Allow any person to help teens obtain abortions without their parents knowing.
- Protect abortion providers from penalties for killing or injuring a woman during an abortion.
- Revoke state law that requires abortion facilities to be licensed and inspected.
- Require taxpayers to pay for abortions.

This amendment allows abortion for:

- ANY ONE: any age...including minors
- ANY TIME: up to the moment of birth...and beyond birth
- ANY WHERE: in a medical facility...or any other location

Vote NO

- On legal abortion through all nine months of pregnancy for any reason.
- On anyone performing abortions.
- On ending parental consent for teenage abortions.
- On allowing legal immunity for medical and non-medical abortionists.





Did You Know?

- Without the AMS there would be no Catholic chaplains.
 The AMS is the only Catholic diocese in the United States
 responsible for endorsing priests to serve as military chaplains
 and for the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Centers.
- AMS faithful are the men and women serving in the United States Armed Forces, enrolled in U.S. Military Academies, undergoing treatment at a Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center, working in civilian jobs for the federal government beyond U.S. borders - and their families.
- Programs and services readily available in other U.S. diocese, and vital to the men, women, and children served by this Archdiocese, include Evangelization and Catechesis, Sacramental Records, Tribunal, Vocations, and the pastoral care of Veterans.
- The AMS is the Archdiocese for the Military Services, not
 of the Military Services. This is an important distinction,
 as it receives no funding from the U.S. Government or
 U.S. Military and has no parishes from which to receive a
 weekly assessment. Instead, it must rely on the generosity
 of individuals, foundations, and organizations whose
 values and priorities align with its mission, programs and
 services.
- The AMS Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program is the only U.S. Vocations Program that provides priests to serve as military chaplains, and also to serve in parishes and dioceses across the country that struggle with their own critical shortage of ministers.
- In 2021, the number of sacraments celebrated for AMS faithful included 1,428 baptisms, 975 confirmations, 1,070 first Holy Communions, and 192 marriages.

AMS Coat of Arms

The coat of arms of the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA is divided into three sections, one in red, one in silver or white, and one in blue – the traditional colors of the United States. In the uppermost portion, there is an American Bald Eagle holding in each claw the universal symbol of peace, a green olive branch. In the middle portion, there is a silver cross on the outline meridians of the earth.

In the lowest, the red portion of these arms, are the gold and silver crossed keys of Saint Peter. The composition of the arms conveys the message and mission of the Archdiocese for the Military Services – to be Americans bearing peace; to proclaim Christ all over the world; and to carry out the mission of the Church to offer healing through the forgiveness of sins.
