

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


In today's Gospel, Jesus describes events leading up to the end times: wars, earthquakes, famines, plagues, persecution, and even death. It's no wonder some Christians believe the Second Coming could be any day now. After all, our world has seen more than its share of these signs. However, as Jesus tells the disciples, we don't know when the end times will come. We do know, however, that Jesus remains at our side through the thick and thin of these "in between times." Just as Jesus tells the disciples he will give them "wisdom in speaking" to refute their enemies, he will give us the strength we need to persevere in faith. As St. Paul reminds us, we can do that by imitating the early Christians, working quietly to build up the kingdom of God each day.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When facing a difficult decision or situation, it can be easy to fall into the trap of "catastrophizing" – that is, thinking of our biggest fear coming true, or of the worst that can happen. Today's readings include a laundry list: a blazing fire, toil and drudgery, wars and insurrections, earthquakes, famines, persecution, and death. Yet Jesus tells the disciples, "not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance you will secure your lives." Rather than focus on our fears – not only about the end times but in our day-to-day lives – Jesus challenges us to trust in God's love for us. It doesn't mean we should resign ourselves to the difficulties we or others face. However, by placing faith over fear we can seek to help others here on earth, confident that Jesus will lead us home when our time comes.

ACT Many people today suffer due to natural disasters, authoritarian leadership, and human violence. Pray for these victims, of course, but also – in your creativity – seek out ways to use your time, talent, and/or treasure to alleviate their situation if possible.

or more than 50 years, the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) has supported organizations that combat poverty and improve the lives of people in communities across the United States. From empowering immigrants in towns along the southern border to advocating for improved housing and educational opportunities in northern and midwestern cities, CCHD-funded groups tackle a wide range of economic and social justice challenges that affect local communities in rural and urban areas.

In areas of Tennessee where coal-mining operations and landfills have caused water pollution and other environmental damage, Statewide Organizing for Community eMpowerment (SOCM) works with governments and regulatory agencies to limit hazardous waste disposal in landfills and to require environmental cleanup as part of the permitting process for new business operations.


Environmental damage affects all of us, most especially low-income people who are affected by water pollution resulting from mineral extraction, lack of access to healthy foods in urban "food deserts," and natural disasters caused by climate change. The Church teaches that "the natural environment is

a collective good, the patrimony of all humanity and the responsibility of everyone" (Pope Francis, Laudato Si', no. 95). Since the release of Laudato Si' in 2015, CCHD has invested more than \$4.3 million in organizations that work to protect the environment and combat pollution. When you support CCHD, you support organizations that work to protect the air, soil, and water for all the members of their communities.



# James Cardinal Hickey Endowment Fund close to its \$1 million goal for St. Brigid School

This is a story about a Cardinal's commitment to his Catholic school in Midland and the support of the parishioners of St. Brigid of Kildare Parish to carry on his legacy as the school celebrates its 100th anniversary.

Members of St. Brigid's have raised more than \$950,000 for the *James Cardinal Hickey Endowment Fund* to make sure that St. Brigid School's operations are supported in perpetuity. The goal is \$1 million.

"The campaign is a perfect opportunity to acknowledge the legacy of Cardinal Hickey and do everything we can to preserve it for the future," said Father Andy Booms, pastor of St. Brigid's.

Cardinal Hickey, referred to by some as St. Brigid's "Golden Child," attended grade school at St. Brigid, was ordained in 1946 and became the Auxiliary Bishop of the Saginaw Diocese in 1967. He served as Bishop of Cleveland and was elevated to Archbishop of Washington, D.C. in 1980, and then to Cardinal by Pope John Paul II in 1988. He died in 2004.

Cardinal Hickey himself established the endowment with \$50,000 seed money in 1991 and the fund grew to \$1 million. In 2010, school trustees voted to use the majority of it to help fund a \$3 million school expansion to add a middle school, gymnasium, kitchen, and remodeling of the original building.

"We had outgrown the grade school building and needed the expansion to keep the school vital," Father Andy said. "Our goal now is to restore the endowment for the future."

Father Andy explained that the leaders were able to draw down the money in the original endowment because the fund was managed privately and there were no restrictions. As of 2011, the endowment has been managed by the Catholic Community Foundation of Mid-Michigan and only the interest is available on an annual basis.

The current campaign was launched with a sizable gift from the estate of parishioner and school alumnus Therese Nowak. Interest from the endowment will be used exclusively for the school including recruitment, training, programs, improvements and operations.

Enrollment is projected between 140 to 150 for the 2022-2023 school year.

The campaign was set up with the help of Kristin Smith, executive director of CCFMM. Father Andy said her advice and guidance put the parish on the path to reach its goal.

"We are making a final push to complete the journey," Father Andy said.

## CCFMM June Grants and Designated Distributions

Every year the Catholic Community Foundation of Mid-Michigan distributes funds from designated endowments to Catholic schools, parishes and Catholic organizations throughout the Diocese of Saginaw. This year the CCFMM distributed over \$450,000. Below is the summary of these distributions.

Catholic Agencies recevied \$6,172 from two endowments.

Catholic International Organizations received \$4,406 from two endowments.

Catholic Organizations recevied \$8,112 from one endowment.

Catholic Parishes received \$92,601 from twenty-five endowments.

Catholic Schools received \$262,598 from sixty-three endowments.

Religious Education Programs received \$76,730 from twenty-one endowments.
