

"Rescued People... Rescue People"

- Fr. Nate's Update -

Dear Saint-in-the-Making, Happy Lord's Day! [Above: Anastasis Icon, see below for description]

In order to help you understand "The Story", God's Story, and how your story fits into it, so you can help Jesus rescue others in danger, here is the 4th homily of the series:

Advent Homily Series:
What is the Good News?
Created, Captured, Rescued,
Response

Homily #4, Part 2 (Last week was Part 1): WHAT IS MY RESPONSE?

I realize it's often a sacrifice to come to Mass; it's difficult to understand the Scriptures, how they apply to our life, how they fit into our story, how we can evangelize. That's why I'm giving this four part homily series called, What is the Good News? Created, Captured, Rescued, Response. These four words summarize "The Story" and help us understand our personal story, so we can help Jesus rescue others.

[See last week's bulletin for Homily #4, Part 1] 4.The fourth part of The Story is RESPONSE; your personal response to being created and rescued.

*Grace to pray for: Good Father, gives us the specific graces of gratitude, surrender, and courage:

- Gratitude for all that God has done for us in Jesus
- Surrender to Jesus as Lord of my life
- Courage to help God get His world back as an "agent of sabotage"

RESPOND with gratitude: offering Him not only worship but also GRATITUDE for all He DID in the past, and all He is DOING in our daily lives.

Fr. John says, ask yourself, "What's the reasonable, logical, and intelligent response to a God who is so grand that he made a universe that's [90] billion light-years across?" ... a God who loves so deeply that he humbled himself to become flesh, disguised himself to go into battle, bound the strong one, crushed the powers of sin and death, and laid down his life for us and rose from the dead who is now preparing a place for you and me and will come back to create a new heaven and a new earth. What's the reasonable response to a God who does all that? Isn't it to give him everything?"

RESPOND with surrender to Jesus: to give Him everything. Jesus on the cross says, "I thirst" (John 19:28). He thirsts for you, and for me, to entrust our lives to him! Surrender to Jesus means offering Him our idols. What is an idol?

- Anything we see as more important than God
- Anything that absorbs our heart and mind more than God
- Anything we hope can satisfy and fulfill us when only God can

Offering Him our idols is a daily struggle: to say no to temptation and yes to Jesus.

Surrender to Jesus is not a one time thing but a daily thing. A priest was asked, "When did you decide to become a priest?" He said, "This morning." Every day Jesus invites us to surrender our lives to him again, to echo Mary, "Behold, the servant of the Lord; be it done unto me according to your Word." (Luke 1:38). In other words, "I am yours; do whatever you want in my life."

RESPOND with courage: courage to help God get his world back! Our goal as Christians is not just to "reach heaven," it's also to help others reach heaven. C. S. Lewis says this means becoming an "agent of sabotage"; sabotaging the enemy's plans for your life and for others. RESCUED PEOPLE!

Last time I had us imagine being a victim of human trafficking, captured and held in a prison, and then being rescued by a Rescuer, who conquers and ties up the trafficker, and leads you to freedom. Imagine you had made friends with other victims, wouldn't you want to rescue them also? To help your Rescuer to rescue them?

Jesus has rescued us to help Him rescue others. We help Him rescue others first with our <u>example</u>, by living differently, by showing "head turning love", by forgiving our enemies and praying for them. To live in such a way that people will think, "Because of you, I know who God is. Because of you, I know God loves me."

But we also help Jesus rescue others with our words. My hope for us is that we will look for opportunities to share The Story by using these four words: Created, Captured, Rescued, Response. We can share it quickly and in our own words, but it takes practice. The free Rescue Project videos online at therescueproject.us, or the book Rescued can help us to better know The Story; it is available at the office.

[Above] Here is an icon called the <u>Anastasis</u>, which means "resurrection." Jesus is shining in glory. Here is his divine light surrounding Him. Below are locks and keys, representing sin and death, that made us CAPTIVES. There is the enemy, the devil, tied up and powerless. He is pulling Adam and Eve out of their graves, the realm of the dead.

See how His knees are bent and his hands are outstretched. He invites YOU to reach out and allow

Him to grasp your hand, and pull you into His embrace.

To pull you out of whatever tomb, prison, or personal hell you're in.

To strengthen you to carry your cross, to suffer well, to offer your suffering to God for the salvation of souls, to not be bitter or resentful.

To empower you to fight against our enemies; sin, death, and the devil.

To empower you to help Him get his world back, to rescue others, to invite others to <u>reach out</u> to Him, as you have.

I invite you to pray this surrender prayer from Fr. John:

God, I believe that out of your infinite love, you created me. I'm sorry for all the times I have believed the enemy's lies that you are not a good Father and that you don't love me. Please forgive me for all of my sins. Thank you for sending Jesus, the Ambush Predator, to rescue me from sin, death, hell and Satan. I choose this day to place your Son, Jesus, at the center of my life. And so, today, here and now, I surrender to you, Jesus, and desire your lordship over every area of my life. I ask you now to flood my soul with the gift of the Holy Spirit. Help me to know my true identity as a beloved son/daughter. Help me to know that I matter and that I am worth dying for. Recreate me to be the person you destined me to be. Please use me as an instrument in your merciful hands to rescue others and to help recreate this world that you so love. Amen

God loves and thirsts for you, I love and pray for you, pray for me! -Fr. Nate

Praying with Scripture: Lectio Divina (Divine Reading)

The Church encourages us not just to read Scripture, but to pray with it. Throughout the centuries, Christians have practiced a form of praying with scripture called Lectio Divina, or Divine Reading. They've found it really helpful to deepen their relationship with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It will help you hear God speaking personally to you in life-changing ways. You will experience new faith, hope, love, and peace.

The steps:

- FIND a short passage from one of the Gospels, e.g. Gospel for Sunday.
- **ASK** the Holy Spirit for enlightenment (the most important step). Also, ask for a specific grace, like one of the graces from *Created-Captured-Rescued-Response*, or to taste the Father's love for you; to get to know Jesus better; to grow in trust, etc.
- **READ** (lectio): What does the passage say in itself? Read the entire passage. It is helpful to read it with a Catholic commentary to help you understand, such as the Word on Fire Bible.
- MEDITATE (meditatio): What does the passage say to me?
 - Re-read the passage, and if a verse, phrase, or word strikes you, stop and savor it by repeating it slowly aloud or in your mind. No rush- the Holy Spirit may wish you to savor one word or phrase for the entire prayer time!
- PRAY/CONVERSE (oratio): What do I say to God in response to His Word?
 Talk freely with whomever you want to- the Father, Jesus, the Holy Spirit,
 Mary, etc. Ask about what conversion/change of mind, habit, or lifestyle the Lord may be asking of you.
- **CONTEMPLATE** (contemplatio): Rest in God's presence. Focus on Jesus' Presence in your heart, or in the tabernacle if you're in a Catholic Church. "Be still and know that I am God." You don't need to say anything. You might find it helpful to slowly, quietly whisper the Name of Jesus, or Abba Father, or Come Holy Spirit.
- **JOURNAL**: Afterwards, it's really helpful to write down a few thoughts, feelings, desires, even if just a couple sentences, and review it next time.

As you practice praying with the Word, you will let Jesus fill you with His light, and His light will shine through you whether you realize it or not!

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Zep 2:3; 3:12-13 | 1 Cor 1:26-31 | Mt 5:1-12a




I have a competitive streak. Whether it's guessing Wordle in one try, grabbing the last Doorbuster deal at Kohl's or snagging Boardwalk early in a game of Monopoly, I like to win. For this reason, the readings today especially challenge me. In a world that values success, wealth and "winning," today's readings turn things upside down when it comes to status and justice. In Zephaniah, God chooses the "humble and lowly." In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus lays out a road map to lasting happiness that bears little resemblance to what the world tells us, and even what our own instincts may tell us, about being "happy." I'll still buy Boardwalk at the first opportunity, but Jesus' words invite me to focus on seeking righteousness, and to be merciful and "clean of heart." They encourage me to seek the happiness that only Christ can give. Through prayer and reflection on these words, we can ask the Lord to transform our hearts and lives to align with what it truly means to be blessed.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Pope Francis has referred to the Eight Beatitudes as a kind of Christian "identity card." (General Audience, Jan. 2020) And he had a suggestion for those of us, like me, who love to listen to the Sermon on the Mount but may not be sure where to start when it comes to living it. His suggestion is simple: "There are eight Beatitudes, and it would be nice to learn them by heart and to repeat them in order to keep this law that Jesus gives us in our mind and in our hearts." Perhaps we can place each Beatitude on a sticky note by the mirror, incorporate them into our morning prayers, teach them to our children or discuss them with friends. Practice makes perfect, yes? As Pope Francis reminds us, "the Beatitudes always bring you to joy; they are the paths to reach joy."

STUDY Memorize the Eight Beatitudes. Learn about each one by reading the writings of Pope Francis or another theologian such as Bishop Robert Barron. Ask God to help you incorporate them into your daily life.

Bishop Gruss

Bishop Robert Gruss was born June 25, 1955, in Texarkana, Arkansas. He attended Madison Area Technical College, in Madison, Wisconsin, and Spartan School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and was a corporate pilot and flight instructor from 1980-1989 before entering seminary. He pursued seminary studies at St. Ambrose University, in Davenport 1989-1990; at North American College, Rome, 1990-1994; and the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas, also known as the Angelicum, in Rome. He additionally earned a Master of Arts degree in Spiritual Theology at the University of St. Thomas Aquinas in 1994. In 1999, he completed studies at the Institute of Priestly Formation (IPF) with an emphasis on Spiritual Direction training.

Bishop Gruss was ordained to the priesthood on July 2, 1994 by Bishop William E. Franklin, seventh Bishop of Davenport. In 2007, Pope Benedict named him a Chaplain of his Holiness, giving him the title of monsignor. He was appointed by Pope Benedict XVI as Bishop of Rapid City in 2011 and consecrated as a bishop on July 28, 2011.



Peter Herbeck


