Dear Saint-in-the-Making, Last weekend Jesus invited you and me, "Come to me all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest..." Sometimes people don't realize the burdens they're carrying until they go to Adoration and sit in silence before Jesus. He will take your burdens from you and gives you rest. And often you experience the gift of healing, as you feel relief, knowing that He's present, He loves you, and He will take care of everything. Stop in to visit Jesus in Adoration at St. John Church each Friday from 9:30-10:30am, and each 1st Friday from 9:30am-4pm. He will give you rest!

Last weekend Gospel Jesus also told us, "Father... although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you

have revealed them to little ones." Henry, a prisoner I speak to on the phone weekly, told me last night about a story he invented: A man came and knocked on the door of one house. They wouldn't let them in. The man knocked on the door of another house. They would not let him in. Finally, he knocked on the door of a third house. It was a poor person, and he let him in. Who was the man? Jesus!" Little ones are those who let Jesus into the door of their hearts! He is knocking daily...

He also says, "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." What is His yoke? Discipleship; making Him our everything. Exercising, picking rocks, pulling weeds, serving others, etc. can feel like burdens. But doing it next to someone is much easier. Jesus is next to us, and wants us to live our lives next to him, with him!



Regarding the title of this update, CREATED - CAPTURED- RESCUED-RESPONSE, it helps us to remember and to share the Gospel with others. I intend to repeat the acronym CCRR over and over to our parish, because "Repetition is the mother of learning." From ThoughtCo.com: "The brain's neural networks form, store, and re-form information into long-term memory that can be recalled like files on a computer or tablet. In order for a new vocabulary word to make the journey into the brain's long term memory, a student must be exposed to the word in timed intervals; 17 timed intervals to be exact."

I hope we ALL memorize CCRR and what each letter stands for, so we can share the Gospel with others: family, grandchildren, friends, waitresses, whomever the Holy Spirit inspires! Homilies about CCRR are available at goodshepherdubly.com. Download the HALLOW app and listen to Fr. John Riccardo preach on CCRR!

CREATED: Why is there something rather than nothing?

CAPTURED: What the hell happened? Why is everything so messed up?

RESCUED: What has God done about it? RESPONSE: What is my response?

St. Paul Street Evangelization

GREG GUZA'S TESTIMONY July 2023

Who wants to be rich? Who among us desires financial freedom? Who feels financially burdened? Like you can't get ahead, caught up, or even keep your head above water? Being self-employed with a large family for the last thirty years has given me opportunity to wonder where God is at times. Looking back over the years, two particular years come to mind. The first was ten years ago when I was needed at home for half the summer. The second was five years ago when I was needed again for six months. In each of these occasions God somehow supplied greater income than the previous years! Unfortunately, this reality didn't sink into my soul, yet.

Only recently have I begun to realize that all these years I have been trying to do it alone. Thought I was so great that I could keep it all together myself. I realize now how I became a "work machine" for efficiency and profit!

Thankfully, God planned ahead and gave me a wife who is rooted in faith and relationships! By the grace of God, and her example, I'm beginning to grow in that direction. I still had to deal with the feeling that I had to do everything for everyone, that if the phone rang I had to answer it. I was giving work, my all, with the leftovers going to my family! Now that I finally realize it, what could I do to figure out the right way? Here again, God planned ahead! Fortunately for me, I was raised in the faith! The phrase, "It is better to give than to receive" came to mind. To give God my heart, my mind, my strength and to love my family! This helped me prioritize family and people over profit.

Additionally, when Covid hit and we were on lockdown, God put it on my heart to pray from the Magnificat (a monthly publication that has morning and night prayers and the prayers for Mass that day) as a family each morning. Why not? There was nothing better to do! The practice stuck and it is awesome! Praying the Mass and daily readings has helped me be in God's presence and likewise with the people in my life!
