I was inspired by presentations at St. John Student Center in Lansing by high school through college-aged interns in the "Protect Life Michigan" summer internship.





These young people are changing hearts and minds by peaceful and prayerful discussion with students and others on the streets of Lansing, Gaylord, Ann Arbor, and other places. May the Holy Spirit continue to stir up their baptismal gifts of courage and prophecy, and open the hearts of all they will talk to!

Each intern, including parishioners Josie and Utah Gusa (pictured with their siblings Maze and Haili, and grandma Shirley), gave powerpoint presentations on different books they'd read about various topics in the greatest human rights movement of all time, the Pro-life movement. I encourage you to talk with them about their experiences.!

Did you know every day in our country, over 2,300 human beings are violently destroyed by surgical abortion, with their mothers suffering trauma? Countless more are killed by abortifacient "contraceptives", "devices", and the abortion pill now being distributed by Walgreens, Rite Aid, and CVS pharmacies. If you belong to one of these, pray about switching to another pharmacy, and tell them why you're switching. I switched from Walgreens to Meijers. Please pray the rosary daily for an end to abortion and for the healing of those who've had abortions, and for conversion of hearts.

Ask Padre: What should I do or not do on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation?

Did you know the Church instructs us to treat holy days of obligation [note: not every holy day is a day of "obligation"] the same way we treat Sundays? Let's allow these beautiful teachings from the Catechism of the Catholic Church to inspire us to resolve to "keep holy the Lrd's Day" by treating Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation in the ways God lovingly commands us to do:

2181 The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin.

2182 Participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a <u>testimony of belonging</u> and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church. The faithful give witness by this to their communion in faith and charity. Together they <u>testify</u> to God's holiness and their hope of salvation. They <u>strengthen</u> one another under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

2184 Just as God "rested on the seventh day from all his work which he had done," (Gen. 2:2) human life has a rhythm of work and rest. The institution of the Lord's Day helps everyone enjoy adequate rest and leisure to cultivate their familial, cultural, social, and religious lives.

2185 On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are to refrain from engaging in work or activities that hinder the worship owed to God, the joy proper to the Lord's Day, the performance of the works of mercy, and the appropriate relaxation of mind and body. Family needs or important social service can legitimately excuse from the obligation of Sunday rest. The faithful should see to it that legitimate excuses do not lead to habits prejudicial to religion, family life, and health.

2186 Those Christians who have leisure should be mindful of their brethren who have the same needs and the same rights, yet cannot rest from work because of poverty and misery. Sunday is traditionally consecrated by Christian piety to good works and humble service of the sick, the infirm, and the elderly. Christians will also sanctify Sunday by devoting time and care to their families and relatives, often difficult to do on other days of the week. Sunday is a time for reflection, silence, cultivation of the mind, and meditation which furthers the growth of the Christian interior life.

2172 God's action is the model for human action. If God "rested and was refreshed" on the seventh day, man too ought to "rest" and should let others, especially the poor, "be refreshed." (Ex 31:17; cf. 23:12) The sabbath brings everyday work to a halt and provides a respite. It is a day of protest against the servitude of work and the worship of money. (Cf. Neh 13:15-22; 2 Chr 36:21)
