Dear "Disciple on Mission",

If you're early to Mass, consider marinating in the readings in the hymnal and prayers in the prayer section in the middle. I need to address something for the sake of building community in our parish, which is one of our three "parish priorities". (Holy Spirit please help me and help my readers!) I invite us to pay close attention to the pronouns we use in refering to fellow parishioners. Sometimes I hear parishioners refer to fellow parishioners as "they/them" instead of "we/us." Also, all our church sites and Mass times and events are "ours", rather than "theirs." St. John, St. Ignatius, St. Joseph, St. Columbkille are "our" churches, part of "our" parish. All Good Shepherd Parish Mass times and events are "our" Mass times and events. For example, rather than saying "their Youth Mass", please say, "our Youth Mass." Thank you for all you do to build community in our parish, including using proper pronouns.

Here's a poem I invite you to meditate on. I beg the Holy Spirit to help you come to "come to know and believe the love God has for [you]"... (1 Jn 4:16)

Someone is Smitten

What if I hinted that Someone is smitten? Head over heels Who loves without quittin' And cares for you more than a kid for her kitten

Just savagely smitten with you

What if I mentioned you're now on His mind?

Not once in a while

But all of the time

With eyes for you only! Since you He designed

And for you, was nailstruck

I know that at the end of the road, Jesus is waiting for me. . . . I have discovered that God exists, that He is love, faithfulness, joy, certitude, to the end of the ages. My days are not easy. They are hard. But sweet because Jesus is with me."

Through her intercession, may we learn to



suffer well by offering our suffering to Jesus for the conversion of sinners and for other intentions. Perhaps you or someone you know isn't happy with the election of certain politicians; if so, offer up your sufferings (including intentional fasts) for those politicians, for their deeper conversion to Christ!


Seed Commons is a New York City-based national network of community loan funds that make cooperative businesses easier to start and less expensive than obtaining bank loans. Based on a "nonextractive" model, Seed Commons does not require borrowers to make payments on interest or principal until they can cover operating expenses, including market-rate salaries. With support from CCHD, Seed Commons helps workers become

cooperative owners who earn living wages at companies like a Chicago-based window manufacturer, which pays \$2/hour more than it did before it became a cooperative. The employee-owners now earn not only higher wages but profit-sharing checks as well.


Your support of CCHD helps workers become worker-owners who earn living wages and establish economic roots in communities that badly need greater employment and earning opportunities. 


