Praise Report: Three Bills Fail

Contacting your legislators paid off!!! Thankfully these bills failed in the lame duck session in December of 2024. House bill (HB) 6068 which would have allowed sex education classes in our schools to teach children where and how to obtain an abortion and would have required teaching about sexual orientation, gender expression, and various gender relationships failed. After researching the trends of our income/expense for our three cemeteries, what the 10 vicariate parishes rates are for cemetery lots, how much of the income each parish puts towards maintenance (lawn care, etc.) and perpetual care (in savings until the cemetery is filled up), and with encouragement from the diocesan cemetery office to raise our rates to a certain minimum, our Finance Council has decided to raise our rates, effective March 1, 2025. Until then, the current rates will remain:

*Parishioner rate for cemetery lots: \$350 (\$100 maintenance, \$250 perpetual care)

*Non-parishioner rate: \$650 (\$100 maintenance, \$550 perpetual care)

As of March 1, 2025, the rates will go to:

*Parishioner rate for cemetery lots: \$500 (\$400 maintenance, \$100 perpetual care)

*Non-parishioner rate: \$1000 (\$900 maintenance, \$100 perpetual care)

January: Respect Life Month

"On January 22, 1973, the Supreme Court legalized abortion throughout the United States in its companion decisions Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton. Since that time, millions of children have lost their lives, and millions of women and families have been wounded by abortion.

"On June 24, 2022, the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization decision overturned Roe v. Wade, and we praise God for the great opportunity state and federal legislators now have to protect preborn children. While God, in His mercy, ended the nearly fifty-year nationwide regime of abortion on

demand, right now state and federal laws, in many instances, are still hostile to pre-born children. So, great prayer and advocacy is very needed.

"The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), no. 373, designates January 22 as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children": In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22 (or January 23, when January 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion.

How to Participate on January 22

How observe Jan. 22 with prayer and penance? Pick from the ideas below or offer some other prayer or sacrifice that you feel called to do:

- Go to Daily Mass
- Abstain from meat
- Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet or Rosary
- Fast from social media or TV
- Offer A Prayer for the Unborn and their parents to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament
- Sacrifice some of your free time and offer to God a small act of service for someone

12 Ways to Obtain a Jubilee Indulgence

The Vatican has detailed how to obtain plenary indulgences - removing temporal punishment (consequences) for sin through Christ's merits - during the 2025 Jubilee Year.

Requirements: detachment from sin (even venial), confession within about 20 days, Communion, and prayer for the Pope's intentions (e.g., an Our Father and Hail Mary). Each indulgence requires a separate Communion and prayer, ideally on the day of the indulgenced act. Only one plenary indulgence can be obtained per day, but a second is possible if applied to souls in purgatory.

Ways to obtain the indulgence include:

Pilgrimages

- 1. National. The Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C (see article for details)... 2. International. In Rome (see article for details)... OR
- 3. Close to Home. Visit any site designated for Jubilee pilgrimages by the local bishop. (Including our Cathedral of St. Mary in Saginaw!)

Eucharistic Visits

Pilgrimage Sites. At any site listed above, spend time in Eucharistic adoration, concluding with the Our Father, a Profession of Faith (Creed), and prayers to Mary.

Pilgrimages in Spirit

Those impeded by "serious reasons" — cloistered religious, the elderly, the sick, prisoners, caregivers — can get the indulgence by uniting spiritually with pilgrims, especially through EWTN or other media, and reciting an Our Father and Creed, "offering up their sufferings or the hardships of their lives."

Works of Mercy and Penance

Formation. Participate in a study on the Vatican II documents or the Catechism, held in a church or other suitable place, "according to the mind of the Holy Father."

Visits. Spend time with those in need — the sick, prisoners, lonely elderly, the disabled — "making a pilgrimage to Christ present in them."

Fasting and Abstinence. In a spirit of penance, give up "futile distractions" (real or online) and "superfluous consumption" (through fasting, abstinence or almsgiving) for at least one day.

Defend Life and Volunteer. Support efforts defending life at all stages or helping abandoned children, struggling youth, the needy, lonely elderly or migrants. Do acts of community service.

Blessing. Receive the "papal blessing" from your bishop.

Catholic Teaching on Purgatory and Indulgences

Why do Catholics believe in the state of purgatory?

The Catechism states, "All who die in God's grace, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." (CCC 1030)

Fr. Frank Sofie says, "Purgatory is not an anti-biblical doctrine; it is not unreasonable. It is a doctrine of comfort and mercy. Nor is Purgatory a late invention of the Church, as many Protestants claim. Evidence for belief is purgatory goes back to Judaism herself with the Maccabees. The earliest Christians believed in this state. As stated earlier, it is not till the Reformation that we find the first denial of purgatory. Scripture commands us to 'keep the traditions' that has been handed down to us (2 Th 2.15). If we are to be faithful to the Scripture, then acceptance of purgatory follows since, as St. Augustine shows, purgatory is part of that 'tradition.'"

Pope Benedict XVI describes it like this, "Some recent theologians are of the opinion that the fire which both burns and saves is Christ himself, the Judge and Saviour. The encounter with him is the decisive act of judgement. Before his gaze all falsehood melts away. This encounter with him, as it burns us, transforms and frees us, allowing us to become truly ourselves. All that we build during our lives can prove to be mere straw, pure bluster, and it collapses. Yet in the pain of this encounter, when the impurity and sickness of our lives become evident to us, there lies salvation. His gaze, the touch of his heart heals us through an undeniably painful transformation "as through fire". But it is a blessed pain, in which the holy power of his love sears through us like a flame, enabling us to become totally ourselves and thus totally of God." (Spe Salvi, 47)

Can purgatory be avoided? How do we avoid it?

St. Therese of Lisieux said to Sr. Maria Philomena, who thought it almost impossible to avoid purgatory, "You do not have enough trust. You have too much fear before the good God. I can assure you that He is grieved over this. You should not fear Purgatory because of the suffering there, but should instead ask that you not deserve to go there in order to please God, Who so reluctantly imposes this punishment. As soon as you try to please Him in everything and have an unshakable trust He purifies you every moment in His love and He lets no sin remain. And then you can be sure that you will not have to go to Purgatory." When Therese discovered her novices sometimes said that they would probably have to expect to go to Purgatory, she responded, "Oh! How you grieve me! You do a great injury to God in believing you're going to Purgatory. When we love, we can't go there."

Myths about Indulgences³

Indulgences. The very word stirs up more misconceptions than perhaps any other teaching in Catholic theology. Those who attack the Church for its use of indulgences rely upon—and take advantage of—the ignorance of both Catholics and non-Catholics.

What is an indulgence? The Church explains, "An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment [consequences] due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain defined conditions through the Church's help when, as a minister of redemption, she dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions won by Christ and the saints" (Indulgentarium Doctrina 1)...

Catholics should not be defensive about indulgences. They are based on principles straight from the Bible. Pope Paul VI declared, "[T]he Church invites all its children to think over and weigh up in their minds as well as they can how the use of indulgences benefits their lives and all Christian society. . . . Supported by these truths, holy Mother Church again recommends the practice of indulgences to the faithful" (Indulgentarium Doctrina, 9, 11).

Myth 1: A person can buy his way out of hell with indulgences.

Since indulgences remit only temp oral penalties, they cannot remit the eternal penalty of hell. Once a person is in hell, no amount of indulgences will ever change that fact. The only way to avoid hell is by appealing to God's eternal mercy while still alive. After death, one's eternal fate is set (Heb. 9:27).

Myth 2: A person can buy indulgences for sins not yet committed.

The Church has always taught that indulgences do not apply to sins not yet committed. The Catholic Encyclopedia notes, "[An indulgence] is not a permission to commit sin, nor a pardon of future sin; neither could be granted by any power."

Myth 3: A person can "buy forgiveness" with indulgences.

The definition of indulgences presupposes that forgiveness has already taken place... They deal only with punishments [consequences] left after sins have been forgiven.

Myth 4: Indulgences were invented as a means for the Church to raise money. Indulgences developed from reflection on the sacrament of reconciliation. They are a way of shortening the penance of sacramental discipline and were in use centuries before money-related problems appeared.

Myth 5: An indulgence will shorten your time in purgatory by a fixed number of days. The number of days which used to be attached to indulgences were references to the period of penance one might undergo during life on earth. The Catholic Church does not claim to know anything about how long or short purgatory is in general, much less in a specific person's case.

Myth 6: A person can buy indulgences.

The Council of Trent instituted severe reforms in the practice of granting indulgences, and, because of prior abuses, "in 1567 Pope Pius V canceled all grants of indulgences involving any fees or other financial transactions" (Catholic Encyclopedia).

Myth 7: A person used to be able to buy indulgences.

One never could "buy" indulgences. The financial scandal surrounding indulgences that gave Martin Luther an excuse for his heterodoxy, involved indulgences in which the giving of alms to some charitable fund or foundation was used as the occasion to grant the indulgence. There was no outright selling of indulgences....

How to Gain an Indulgence: To gain any indulgence you must be a Catholic in order to be under the Church's jurisdiction, and you must be in a state of grace because apart from God's grace none of your actions are fundamentally pleasing to God (meritorious). You also must have at least the habitual intention of gaining an indulgence by the act performed.

To gain a <u>partial indulgence</u>, you must perform with a contrite heart the act to which the indulgence is attached. To gain a <u>plenary indulgence</u> you must perform the act with a contrite heart, plus you must go to confession [within 20 days] (one confession may suffice for several plenary indulgences), receive Holy Communion [ideally on the day of the indulgenced act], and pray for the pope's intentions. The final condition is that you must be free from all attachment to sin, including venial sin. If you attempt to receive a plenary indulgence, but are unable to meet the last condition, a partial indulgence is received instead. [Don't forget to offer the indulgence for someone: "The faithful can gain indulgences for themselves or apply them to the dead." (CCC 1471)]

- Below are indulgences listed in the Handbook of Indulgences [see other options for the year 2025]:

 An act of spiritual communion, expressed in any devout formula whatsoever, is endowed with a
 - partial indulgence.
 - A partial indulgence is granted the Christian faithful who devoutly spend time in mental prayer.
 - A plenary indulgence is granted when the rosary is recited in a church or oratory or when it is recited in a family, a religious community, or a pious association. A partial indulgence is granted for its recitation in all other circumstances.
 - A partial indulgence is granted the Christian faithful who read sacred Scripture with the veneration due God's word and as a form of spiritual reading. The indulgence will be a plenary one when such reading is done for at least one-half hour [provided... other conditions are met].
 - A partial indulgence is granted to the Christian faithful who devoutly sign themselves with the cross while saying the customary formula: "In the name of the Father... [etc.]"
