Dear Disciple, Blessed Christmas!

Thank you to everyone who made our Christmas celebrations beautiful! The choirs, the organists, the decorators, the cleaners, each parishioner who dressed up for Christmas, etc. The above nativity scene is next to our St John Church, Good Shepherd Parish of Ubly. Heavenly Father, please reward, in this life and the next, many parishioners for this display- the married couple who donated the stable, the lady who donated the nativity set in memory of her parents, the parishioner who built the manger, the employee who set it up, etc. *Holy Spirit, please let all who see it be given a deeper love for Jesus, Mary, and Joseph!*

You'll notice the manger is empty since I took this picture before Christmas. Now, baby Jesus is there. Throughout the Christmas season, ending Jan. 12 (or Feb. 2 if you want to be traditional) we can ask ourselves, is Jesus in the manger of my heart? Am I inviting Jesus into my heart by daily silence Scripture? Am I allowing Him to fill the emptiness of my heart? Did I go to confession during Advent? Do I need to meet Jesus in the sacrament of confession to begin the New Year by reconciliation with God? When was the last time I met Jesus in confession?

2025 JUBILEE YEAR OF HOPE

Right now, how is your hope? Are you growing in hope? Or losing hope? May this true story help you to grow in hope for yourself and your loved ones.



Bl. Bartolo Longo: Satanic High Priest Who Became Preacher of the Rosary (1841–1926)

Bartolo was raised in a Catholic family that prayed the Rosary daily. As a young man, Bartolo had many hobbies such as flute, violin, piano, fencing, etc. He went to the University of Naples and was surrounded by anticlericalism, atheism, and the occult. Many professors were ex-priests preaching against the Church. "I, too, grew to hate monks, priests and the Pope," he would later write, "and in particular [I detested] the Dominicans, the most formidable, furious opponents of those great modern professors, proclaimed by the university the sons of progress, the defenders of science, the champions of every sort of freedom." (My own great grandfather said something similar: that the Catholic Church was the greatest obstacle to progress in the world!)

Bartolo lured people away from the Catholic faith. But he was empty and did not turn to God for meaning and hope. Instead, he turned to drugs, sexual immorality, and to mediums, who practiced the occult. He was lured into Satanism and eventually "ordained" a satanic priest, promising his soul to a demon.

He began to preside over satanic services and to preach against God and the Church. His family tried to rescue him from this path without success. They prayed for him and asked Professor Vincenzo Pepe to help. He was a Catholic professor at the university. He started to meet with Bartolo. One day he asked him, "Do you want to die in an insane asylum and be damned forever?" The Professor eventually convinced him to talk to a Dominican priest. After three weeks of conversations, on the feast of the Sacred Heart in 1865, the priest welcomed Bartolo back into the Church through confession and absolution.

Professor Pepe let Bartolo move in with him and surrounded him with faithful and dedicated Catholics. As a self-imposed penance, for two years Bartolo worked in the Neapolitan Hospital for Incurables. He became a third-order Dominican. To serve God with an undivided heart, he made a promise of celibacy.

To do reparation for his scandal, he would go to the Satanist hangouts he had formerly visited, then hold up a Rosary and renounce his former ways. One time he walked into a seance, held up a rosary, and called out, "I renounce spiritualism because it is nothing but a maze of error and falsehood."

But the devil still had a grip on him. Bartolo struggled to forgive himself. He struggled to accept God's forgiveness. One day in Pompeii, God opened his eyes to see how he could be rescued and how he could spend his life rescuing others.

"One day in the fields around Pompeii," he wrote, "I recalled my former condition as a priest of Satan... I thought that perhaps as the priesthood of Christ is for eternity, so also the priesthood of Satan is for eternity. So, despite my repentance, I thought: I am still consecrated to Satan, and I am still his slave and property as he awaits me in Hell. As I pondered over my condition, I experienced a deep sense of despair and almost committed suicide. Then I heard an echo in my ear of the voice of Friar Alberto repeating the words of the Blessed Virgin Mary: 'One who propagates my Rosary shall be saved.' Falling to my knees, I exclaimed: 'If your words are true that he who propagates your Rosary will be saved, I shall reach salvation because I shall not leave this earth

without propagating your Rosary."

He spent the rest of his life spreading devotion to Mary and the Rosary and striving to imitate the Rosary's mysteries. With funding from a Countess, he built the famous Basilica of Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary in Pompeii, founded elementary schools, orphanages, and a technical school to give the children of convicts a better life. He wrote books on the Rosary, novenas, etc. He began the popular movement that led to the solemn proclamation of the Dogma of the Assumption in 1950.

In Blessed Bartolo's writings, Pope St. John Paul II discovered the idea of the "Luminous Mysteries" or "Mysteries of Light" which include the events of Jesus' public ministry. Also, Bartolo had given names to these five luminous mysteries. Do you know them? St. JPII proposed new "Mysteries of Light" in his 2002 encyclical "The Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary," He wrote about his admiration for Bartolo. This man's witness shows that no matter how much we turn our back on God, or run away from God, God is chasing us as a Good Shepherd.

St. JPII beatified Bartolo in 1980. At the beatification, Pope John Paul II proclaimed Bl. Bartolo Longo "the man of Our Lady"! Join me in the prayer of Blessed Bartolo for those who are losing hope in their lives, especially those losing hope in Mary, Jesus, and turning to the occult and new age practices:

"O Blessed Rosary of Mary, sweet chain that unites us to God, bond of love that unites us to the angels, tower of salvation against the assaults of Hell, safe port in our universal shipwreck, we will never abandon you. You will be our comfort in the hour of death: yours our final kiss as life ebbs away. And the last word from our lips will be your sweet name, O Queen of the Rosary of Pompei, O dearest Mother, O Refuge of Sinners, O Sovereign Consoler of the Afflicted. May you be everywhere blessed, today and always, on earth and in heaven."
